## TIME FOR WORK.

#### The Board of Trade Should Be Heard From Shortly.

After a trance of several venus the board of trade revived and gave the city a silk mill. Then it iapsed into a state of lethargy from which it sadly neer's arousing. It has been dead for more than a year and this is an exceptionally opportune time for resuscitation. The holiday rush is over and the business men of the city ought to be willing to turn some of their attention toward a movement for the permanent betterment of the municipality's industrial life

Early last spring councils commenced planning improvements. They were encouraged by the press and there seemed to be good prospect of having a new bridge over No. 1 plane, connecting link of pavement between Canaan and Church streets, pavement of intersection of South Main street and Eighth avenue, pavement of Sixth avenue and Park place, together with the sewering of South Spring street, Summit avenue and the grading of several thoroughfares, which need attention. Through the antagonism of the select and common councils and other causes, all these proposed changes came to naught. The city has reached a stage in which it wavers in the balance. Is it going forward or backward?

A reviving of the board of trade might accomplish a much desired work. The establishment of one new industry--employing men-between now and midsummer is quite within the range of possbiility and it would bring with it the confidence which is needed as an impetus to the local industrial fabric The incumbents of the important offices have worked hard in the city' interest and they should be relieved by new blood. Reorganization is the first step necessary to a resuscitation of the board. Who will take the inltiative in bringing it about?


