

NEW RECTOR OF ST. DAVID'S CHURCH

Rev. E. J. McHenry Begins Work Among West Side Episcopalians.

HE CONDUCTED SERVICES SATURDAY

Yesterday He Preached From the Familiar Text "Thou Shalt Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself" and Presented a Discourse of Forceful, Sober Thought -- Mr. McHenry Came to This City From Great Bend, Sasquehanna County.

The congregation of St. David's Episcopal church, West Scranton, are once more in charge of a leader. Rev. E. J. McHenry, late of Great Bend, Pa., became rector Saturday morning, and yesterday conducted the usual church services. Saturday morning at 6.30 o'clock the new rector celebrated holy communion.

In addition to the other services yesterday he preached two forceful sermons. The morning sermon was, in part, as follows:

"St. Matthew gives us this new commandment, 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.' The building has its foundations, and the tree its roots. We do not see buildings or trees suspended in mid-air. Nor do we ever see a building attempt to begin at the top and build downward. We go into the field of law, medicine or science--there is a foundation. As a lawyer will go to his Blackstone, or the physician to his Materia Medica, so the Christian must go to his Book, the Bible, and study among the most innumerable, for the one stone, hard and firm, yet beautiful, which will make such a building that will stand and none of its pillars diminish. Such a corner stone or foundation for Christianity is found in our text, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"

FUNDAMENTAL VIRTUES

Romans submit several virtues out fundamental, but all of them grow out of this one: because it is difficult to approach any of them, except by the way of the one law, 'love.' This presents itself today for our consideration in the form of 'Who is our neighbor?' The extent of the love for him.

The words we have before us are as well as the world itself. The Lord first spoke them to Moses in the general instruction to the Hebrews, then he said: 'Thou shalt not take vengeance nor bear any grudge against the children of thy people, but thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.' I am the Lord. The principle here was fundamental. God had laid upon the Hebrews the task of keeping before the nations the knowledge of Him.

The story of the Samaritan gives heartlessness and indifference when duty was not concerned, but attention and humanity when the laws of mercy are opened. The Samaritan, the despised one, did not pass by, but stopped, looked, then took up and cared for. He was not neighbor to the man according to the Jewish sense. There was no reason in that light for him to stop, much less to care for the helpless one. But when the idea of law was removed, when compassion could be open, then the question presented itself in a new phase. He did not belong to the same family or tribe, but he was a man. The same God ruled both. The same mother earth nourished both.

Our neighbor, then, contrary to the Jewish idea, is any one with whom we come in contact. House, streets, rivers, or even states or colors do not separate.

SELF-SACRIFICE

He who would sacrifice life itself for the good of fellow-men are men who fill us with an holy awe. Such a one becomes sublime. He fills up the measure of the law, love thy neighbor as thyself. The question, however, presents itself, is this a full measure? History abounds with examples of men who would do great things. We are all ready to be heroes in such a sense. Does not the teaching of Christ, while not deprecating such ambition, extol the smaller things?
