The close was strong at the best prices of the close was strong at the best prices of the day. The extreme case of money, call loans being made as low at 1½, was a potential influence in the market's late strength. There were several other beneficial features in the news of the day; the weekly earnings of railways in nearly every case were net increases running up to \$20,000 in Chesapeake and Ohlo, and \$30,000 in Louisville and Nashville. The \$15,000,000 Illinois Central terminal bonds were considerably over-subscribed. These facts together with the action of the house of representatives at Washington in sustaining points of order against Cuban resolutions caused a rising tide in ban resolutions caused a rising tide in quotations, the traders taking the view that legislative action in behalf of Cuba for a while at least was improbable. The total sales were 287,600 shares.


