#### COUNCILS RECEIVE **ESTIMATES FOR 1897**

They Exceed the Estimated Revenue by \$72,993.13.

AVAILABLE REVENUE OF \$295,100

Estimates and City Controller's Statement Referred to the Estimates Committee for Printing and Revision -- Biggest Increase is Asked for the Street Department. Solicitor, City Clerk and Building Inspector Satisfied with the Same Appropriations as for 1897.

The estimated expenditures of the various city departments for the next fiscal year beginning the first Monday in April were received in select council last night, together with the estimate of City Controller E. J. Robinson of the city's revenue during that

The estimated revenue is \$295,100, o \$10,100 more than last year, and the estimated expenditures are \$368,093.31, a difference of \$72,992.31 which the estimates committee will have to get rid of before an appropriation ordinance is reported to councils. The estimated expenditures show an increase of 882,-851.06 over the amount appropriated for the fiscal year 1897.

There are only three departments which do not ask for an increase, the city solicitor's, the city clerk's and the building inspector's departments.

The greatest increase, \$32,658, is asked by Street Commissioner A. B. Dunning, who accompanies his estimate with a long typewritten explanation. Next in the order of increases asked are the park commissioners, police department, health department, maintenance of city hall department and assessors' department. A supplementary estimate from the fire department. which amounts to about \$25,000, will be submitted to the estimates commit-
