Members of Democratic City Committee Oppose Any Alliance. NON-SUIT IN THE DESPEAUX CASE A Suit Against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for Alleged Discrimination, Which Occurred in 1881-1882, Is Ruled Out by Judge Dallas.

Philadelphia, Jan. 21.—A number of the members of the Democratic city committee today declared their opposition to any alliance of the Democrats with either faction of the Republicans in the receiver of taxes campaign. They also called upon Magistrate Douglas to advise the city committee to declare its purpose "in view of the persistent efforts to induce him to withdraw" and enter into a deal to further the election of Harvey K. Newitt, the anti-Martin candidate, as against William J. Ross, Secretary Martin's brother-in-law, who was nominated at the convention which the Newitt men held.
