# MAINE TO GO

[Concluded from Page 1.]

The only remote contingency which might lead to unpleasant consequences was some overt act on the part of the insurgent sympathizers committed with a hope of embroiling Spain and the United States. The movement of the Maine, he added, was entirely in accord with usage, as warshing of two friendly powers frequently enter and leave each other's ports. He was not at all uneasy, as to consequences of the Maine's appearance at Havana.

## SENOR QUESADA'S OPINION.

Senor Quesada, secretary of the Cucan Junta, and Senor Albertini, of the Cuban staff in Washington, were about the capital during the day conferring with members concerning the Cuban status. Mr. Quesada said: "The rending of the Maine to Cuba, whatever be the official version, is, in our opinion, proof that things are in such condition in the few Spanish strongholds that anarchy reigns and that American citizens and property, being mobile to find protection at the hands of the impotent Spanish government, have now the protection of their own vessels."
It is a declaration to the world that

the United States are not aired of the Spanish raide which was to control Spanish afficial. The attitude of the Spanish nations and officials has been that the presence of an American warship in Hayava means intervention, but undoubtedly they will now say that it is the most catural thing for any nation to send its vessels to the ports of a friendly power and Mr. de Lome will declare that his government is delighted. But we shall soon hear from General Weyler's subordinates in Cubs and from Spain. that is, if the cannons of the Maine do not bring to the Spanish minds the conviction that printence in this case is the better part of valor.

## THE MAINE'S DIMENSIONS.

The Maine, which has been selected to make the visit to Havana, is a battleship of the second class, and is regarded as one of the best ships in the navy. Sho was built at the Brooklyn navy yard and is 318 feet long, 57 feet broad, 21.4 mean draught and 6.682 tons displacement. She has two ten-inch vertical turrets, and two military masts, and her motive power is furnished by twin screw vertical triple expansion engines having a maximum horse power of 9,293, capable of making a speed of 17,45 knots.

She carries four 10-inch and six 6-inch breech loading gues in her main battery, and seven 5-pounders and eight 1-pounders rapid fire gues and four Gatlings in her secondary battery and four white head torpedo tubes.

The announced destination was Tortugus, and until news came from Washington this afternoon, it was not generally known here that the Maine was destined for Hayana.
