The Keater case was the first taken In this, the plaintiff, Mrs. J. B. Kentor, of Providence, sues for \$25,000 for permanent injuries resulting from being struck on the head and shoulders by a falling trolley pole

Mrs. Kentor and a party of women friends, on Aug. 30, 1894, started for Mountain Lake to hold a basket picnic While charging cars at the corner of Lackswanns and Wyoming avenue the trolley pole of the South Side car, which snapped in twain, as the conductor swurg it about in changing it and the butt end of it struck Mrs. Kentor a glancing blow on the head and then landed on her shoulder. She now alleges that the accident has permanently injured her pervous system and acfected her eyesight to such an extent that she fears she will yet become totally blind.

It is held that the iron of the trolley pole contained a flaw and that the conductor gave it a violent swing when changing it, both of which, or either is contended is ground for the allegation of negligence.

The company will hold that it was an unavoidable accident. It will show that when the car was inspected the night before no flaws were found in the pole and denial will be made of the allegation that the conductor swung the pole violently when changing it.

Yesterday morning, while on the stand, Mrs. Keator was overcome by one of the nervous attacks which she claims she has regularly suffered from since the accident. She had to be carried from the stand and it was not until late in the afternoon that she was able to resume her testimony. S. P. Price is attorney for the plaintiff and the company is represented by
