CITY IS SAVED.

Solicitor Authorized to Execute a Contract for 1,000 Feet of Hose.

There was a joint session of councils last evening at which the city solicitor was authorized to execute a contract with the Fabric Fire Hose company, of New York, for 1,000 feet of hose at seventy cents a foot.
