PLURALITIES ARE ALL VERY LARGE

Republican School Directors Had Hundreds of Votes to Spare.

WERE WARMLY CONGRATULATED

Their Pluralities Range from 805 for Mr. Neuls to 1872 for Mr. Fellows. Manley and Sweeney Much Cast Down Over Their Detent in the Twelfth Ward -- Edward James, Jr.'s, Election Has Caused Trouble In Democratic Circles.

A careful compilation of the open reterrs in the prothonotary's office yesterday by The Tribune's accountants demonstrated that the returns printed in this paper yesterday morning were nimost absolutely correct. All of the candidates were the recipients of many congratulations yesterday by their friends. The defeat has had a very dispiriting effect on Democrats, coupled with the losses sustained in common council. It was expected by the Democratic candidates for places on the board of six that a very large vote would be polled in all of the strong Democratic wards on account of fierce fights for ward offices in nearly all of them. This proved to be a mis-take. The fierce ward fights injured rather than helped the candidates at the head of the ticket in some wards, while in others Democratic voters became disgusted and refrained attogether from voting.

REPUBLICANS VOTED.

Republicans in general showed a commendably patriotic desire to de their duty and the vote in nearly all of the Republican strongholds was larger than the estimates made by political prophets on the day before election. Fred, Berge was probably one of the most surprised men in the city yesterday. He was nominated by the Democrats as their candidate for poor director in the Third and Twenty-first, and as he had no apparent opposition, took things easy. John McNamara thought he would like to be a poor director and went quietly to work to defeat Mr. Berge. He accomplished the feat, securing 202 against 157 votes cast for Mr. Berge.

James Manley and Morgan Sweeney are much chagrined over their defeat in the Twelfth ward. They knew they had a big fight on their hands, but were confident they would pull out with votes to spare. Mr. Manley has been celect councilman from the Twelfth for eleven years and Mr. Sweeney has represented the ward in the lower branch for six years. Thomas J. Coyne is clated over his second victory over Mark Cahlin in the Twentieth ward. His friends, accompanied by a band, will visit him tomorrow night to celebrate his victory.

Probably no man in the city was more sincerely congratulated yester-day than Edward James, jr., the new select councilman from the Sixth ward. In Democratic circles M. E. Clark and John E. Regan were roundly abused for engaging in a fight that had the effect of giving the office of select council to


