PROSECUTION IS NEAR THE END

Defense in the Lattimer Trial to Begin on Monday.

WILL PROBABLY LAST FOUR WEEKS

Testimony Continued—A Witness Identifies Attorney Palmer as Sheriff Martin—Ziek Becomes Exasperated Under Cross-Examination—Statements Made Regarding Alleged Threats.

Wilkes-Barre, Feb. 18.—From present indications, the committal proceedings in the case against the sheriff and his deputies on trial for the Lattimer shooting to begin on Monday and will last about two weeks.

Today's proceedings in court began with the testimony of Frank Kosciuszki, who said Sheriff Martin stopped them at West Hazelton. He saw two men killed at Lattimer and as he was running away two more were dropped.

The first witness this afternoon was Henry Ruman, who was brought on a stretcher from the Hazelton hospital. He is shot through both hips and may not recover.
