WOLCOTT'S ELOQUENCE

Refutes the Charges Made by Senator Mason.

Not a Patriotic Citizen in the Broad Land Has Not the Fullest Confidence in United States Navy .- A Glorious Record from the Days of Paul Jones -- its Officers Honorable, Brave and Truthtul .- A Splendid Defense of the Grand Institution. An Appropriation for Raising the

Washington, Feb. 18.-A debate, decided in its sensations, was unexpectover the consideration of the resolution of Mr. Allen (Neb.), directing the committee on naval affairs to investigate the disaster to the battleship Maine. An arrangement had been made for the adoption of the resolution with a ninor amendment without debate. Mr Mason (Ill.), however, proposed a substitute providing for an investigation he conducted by a joint committee of two branches of congress. Upon this the Illinois senator, disregarding an appeal not to force a discussion at this time on so melancholy affair, delivered a speech in which he said that the people demanded the truth concerning the explosion and declared that they would ot be satisfied with the investigation to be conducted by the officers of the navy, who would virtually try their own case and would cover up any blame that the facts might show at tached to them. He flercely denounced the policy of the government in dealing with Cuba, into which he went at length and declared that the United States had adopted the policy of Spain in putting everything off until tomor

MASON'S SPEECH

Mr. Mason said in beginning that he had no disposition to inflame a situation already so exciting, but he felt that his substitute was fully justified by the feelings and desires of the peo "I understand," said he, "that the navy department is making an investigation of the disaster, but I also understand that congress has the authority to make an investigation. I is a congressional investigation that the people are demanding. They are fast coming to the conclusion that matters concerning this Cuban affair including the de Lome letter incident and the loss of the Maine, of which they ought to know, are being concealed from them. The people want to know the facts and they will know them." Mr. Mason said there was no calam great as a tailure on the par

of those in power to appreciate the real situation when it was so serious as it now is, and no sorrow so pro found as that over indifference to this situation. The people were sick and tired of secret investigations and reports by cipher, and of having in formation suppressed, and then doled out to them as some executive ofticer might think suitable. He wanted a congressional investigation and wanted it open to the world. He had a letter from Mr. Julian Hawthorne read to show, as he claimed, that murder was the policy of the Spanish government in Cuba. Autonomy, he denounced as a sham, a fraud and a deusion, and the de Lome letter only served to emphasize the treacherous character of the Spaniard. As for himself, he would not, if eligible, be willing to serve on the proposed committee, as he would not want to sit at the table with a Spaniard who might have a stilletto under his clothes, un-less he himself was ironclad. MR. WOLCOTT REPLIES.

Mr. Mason had scarcely taken his seat when Mr. Wolcott addressed the chair. "Mr. President," he said, and the words shot forth like a bomb to be exploded in the senate. It was evident in the Colorado senator's countenance and manner, to say nothing of the intensity of his voice, that he was laboring under considerable feeling. He had listened to Mr. Mason with ill concealed feelings of emotion, his face growing redder and redder, and his prow more and more like a thundercloud as the Illinois senator proceeded. After he had vigorously refuted Mr. Mason's declaration of lack of confidonce in the government, he said: "From the time of Paul Jones until now our ships have salled in every war, face always to the foe. The records of our naval battles are the most glorious history in the page of any country for the last hundred years, and from the earliest days until now there has never been a step backwards. Today, as always, the officers of our navy are honorable, courageous, upright men, and above all they tell the truth. The aptain of this ill-fated battleship was walking his deck at 10 o'clock on the night of the 15th when this awful ayplosion happened. It may be that his public career is ended forever, but the awful disaster that overtook his ship will count for nothing by comparison with the degrading insinuation made

"Mr. President, I speak as one who ympathizes deeply with the citizens of that unfortunate island now engaged in this sterrible, deplorable conflict. I yield to nobody in my losire to see the orclusion of the war, but I do say that t ever there was a moment when we should abstain from outrageous and gratuitous insult to a friendly nation, that time is today. ### PROSECUTION IS

Defense in the Lattimer Trial to Begin on Monday.

WILL PROBABLY LAST FOUR WEEKS

Testimony Continued .- A Witness Identifies Attorney Palmer as Sherift Martin -- Ziek Becomes Exasperated Under Cross-Examination -- Statements Made Regarding Alleged

Wilkes-Barre, Feb. 18.-From present indications, the commonwealth will close its case against the sheriff and his deputies on trial for the Lattimer shooting by tomorrow. The defense is expected to begin on Monday and will about two weeks. The deputies held a meeting last night and passed resolutions of condolence with one of their number, Robert Kay. brother, John A. Kay, was killed on he battleship Maine.

Today's proceedings in court began with the testimony of Frank Kubiski, who said Sheriff Martin stopped them at West Hazleton. He saw two men killed at Lattimer and as he was running away two more were dropped. Several other miners testified to be slightly wounded at Lattimer, and Jo seph Padladeck said when the sheriff stopped the marching men at Lattimer some of the miners crowded forward. He said the sheriff caught hold of two, pulled them from the line, and shouted When asked to point out the Fire. sheriff, Padladeck designated one of the ounsel for the defense, Mr. Palmer.

District Attorney Martin announced to the court at adjournment time tonight that the commonwealth had but three more witnesses and would conclude in the morning. Attorney Lena-han afterward said: "The defense will consume four weeks if all our witiesses are heard."

The first witness this afternoon was rnard Ruman, who was brought on stretcher from the Hazleton hospital, He is shot through both hips and may recover. He said that the sheriff told the strikers at Lattimer to dis-perse, and when the leaders began to rgue he shot down a man standing near to him, and when the man clung to his arm the sheriff struck him down with his revolver butt. He then jumped back and shouted, "Fire."

"I ran at once," said the witness, and had gone a few steps when I was shot in the right hip. I staggered to the railroad and fell on my knees and was then shot twice in the left hip and thigh."

Witness could not tell the name of the man who was shot by the sheriff. Andrew Slabonik showed to the jury ne scars of three wounds. He was shot through each shoulder and in the middle of the back, each ball passing quite through his body. The widow of Mike Cezlak, for whose death the sheriff and deputies are on trial, said that she had been married about sixteen years and had five children.
