Round 5-Kane evidently realized that he would lose at a waiting game and the crowd applauded his success in opening with a right for Dobbs' stomach and a left for the face. Dobbs jumped away from each, the blows landing lightly. Dobbs then resumed piston work with his left, straights and uppercuts, and hooked his right once on the neck. Dobbs went at his man like a huricane. With his left he sent Kane to the floor, but the Call-fornian was up in eight seconds. Dobbs rushed him toward the ropes and did the drop act with a right cross on the jaw. Kane was down when ten seconds had been counted and four seconds later the colored man was helping Kane to his feet. He was assisted to his corner by his

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
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
