

know many men there. They agreed to do so. "Afterward met Sheriff Selzer and Scott, of Carbon and Schuylkill counties, and we had proclamations published in all the papers of Hazleton and posted along the roads. "That night I met a lot of men collected to serve as deputies. I asked them if they were citizens. They agreed and I swore them in. "I told them that it was our duty to maintain the law and if we found anybody violating the law we should arrest them. I said we did not want to hurt or shoot anybody and that we should not shoot unless our lives or theirs were in danger. "I heard a lot of McAdoo strikers were going to march on the next day, so I ordered my men to turn out at 5 o'clock the next morning and come armed. I said I did not care where they got the arms, as long as they got them. I understood there were a lot of rifles in some store room in Hazleton. "The next morning I heard a crowd was at Crystal Ridge. I went over there with five deputies. The mood was just about throwing stones down on the men in the strippings. I ordered three special crowds of them to disperse and they did so, although one or two spoke back to me. Then we went back to Hazleton and I got a dispatch from Beaver Meadow from Superintendent Buller, who said he feared the strikers were coming. We waited, but they did not come. Then we went back to Hazleton.

in danger. After lining them up alongside the road I told them I would go out to meet the strikers and try once more to disperse them. A deputy asked if he should not go with me. No, I said. I'll go alone, I thought one man was enough to die at once. I felt somehow there was going to be trouble. I met the strikers about fifty yards from the deputies and asked them where they were going. A lot of them cried to the breaker. I told them not to go but they crowded around me swearing at me and hustling me alongside. One man tried to grab me, and I then attempted to get hold of him, but the crowd then jumped on me and pounded me about the body. I dropped my paper and pulled my revolver. One of them tried to snatch the revolver from me but failed. Then he struck me, but my revolver would not explode. Then the shooting commenced. It lasted about a half minute. "In the crowd I saw three men armed with revolvers and one with a knife, the latter made a stab at me but missed. I was in direct line of fire." "The cross-examination conducted by Mr. Scarlet lasted for two hours and will be resumed. While many minor details were brought out nothing was adduced to affect the main story.

JURY PASSED UPON THE CASE.

One of the Unusual Cases Held in Aldermanic Court. One of the rare trials by jury before an alderman was heard yesterday before Alderman Wright. The case was that of James J. O'Malley against J. J. Walsh, both of Olyphant, in which the former sought possession of a property bought at sheriff's sale. The plaintiff, O'Malley, had made complaint that after the prescribed three months had elapsed from the date of purchase, Walsh, the defendant, refused to recognize an order to vacate the premises. The following jury was impaneled by the sheriff to hear the case before Alderman Wright: Clark Lowry, M. W. Green, James M. Fryor, T. J. Price, R. O. Bryant and H. C. Warner. A verdict was found for the plaintiff. He was given possession of the property and an award of damages of \$26. The costs were placed on the defendant. There is no appeal from the verdict.

IN THE REGISTER'S OFFICE.

Nuncupative Will was Yesterday Offered for Probate. Register Koch was yesterday directed to issue a citation to the next of kin of the late Edwin A. Wint, of West Market street, to show cause, if they have any, why the nuncupative will filed by his widow, Mary E. Wint, shall not be admitted to probate. The affidavits accompanying the will set forth that the deceased on Feb. 20 last on his death-bed declared to his wife, Mary E. Wint, Eliza Stritch and I. J. Wint, his brother, that he had made a will in writing, but desired that all his property should go to his wife and that his brother should be the executor of his estate. All three, mentioned above as having been about his death-bed, signed the affidavit. Under the law a nuncupative will is admitted to probate only after thirty days after it is declared and cannot be probated until fourteen days after it is offered. Letters of administration were yesterday granted to Mary E. McNulty in the estate of the late Hon. A. F. McNulty, of Archbald. The will of Brian Flaherty, late of Archbald, was admitted to probate and letters testamentary granted to Martin J. Swift.

breaker. I said I would. Soon the mob came, an ugly desperate lot of men, determined to run through the breaker. They charged on us and my men had to push them away by holding their suns like rafts before them and then it was hard work. As they dispersed one man deliberately fired a pistol at us, some deputies pursued him, but he escaped. Friday morning I reached Drifton and found all my deputies there. We went to Lumber Yard, a central point. At one in the afternoon I got a message that the strikers were marching through Cranberry bound for Lattimer. I hurried off with the Hazleton deputies to intercept the men at West Hazleton. While going there I repeated my instructions to the deputies about keeping cool and avoiding trouble if possible. MEETING THE MOB. "The mobs met us when we reached there. I read the proclamation and walked through them asking them to go home. One young man swore at me violently and said they would go to Lattimer in spite of me. I arrested him. One man picked up a stone but I warned them that they had better not do it. "On Thursday I went to Cranberry and dispersed some strikers who were trying to prevent men going to work. Next I got word of a mob at Beaver Meadow and went over there. All was quiet, but the strikers were expected. Sheriff Selzer, of Carbon county, was there alone. He asked me if I would go with men and help to protect the
