The Mistletoe left St. Johns, N. F., Feb. 14, with cod fish for Bahia, Brazii. Heavy weather was encountered two days out and a northeast gale drove her into an ice floe and she was buffeted about for several days. The ice stove in her side and she began to leak. The pumps were manned, but to no effect, and it was decided to head her in the line of trans-Atlantic steamers. The crew suffered much from the cold, but kept at work until on the 26th the Kensington came in sight. Signals were exchanged and the steamer stood by while a boat was lowered from the Mictletoe with the captain and crew. Captain Cave set fire to the abandoned brig before leaving her. Excellent care and attention were given the shipwrecker men by the officers of the steamer.
