# FOR A COLOSSAL DAM.

# Bids for the Culvert Will Be Opened

Today in Wilkes-Baire. Today the Spring Brook Water Supoly company will open bids at its office in Wilkes-Barre for the immense new reservoir to be erected on Gardner's creek, about two and one-half miles south of Yatesville. All the leading contractors of this part of the country are after the job.

It will be an embankment dam with masonry core-wall, and some idea of its great size may be formed when it is told that it will cover about 100 acres of land and will have a capacity of 770,-000,000 gallons. It will be 1,160 feet long and seventy feet high or deep at its deepest. The width at the top of the embankment will be ten feet and it will enclose the core-wall, which will be eighty-three feet high, extending into the earth and into the solid rock to a depth of three feet. The core-wall will be thirteen feet thick at the bottom, tapering to three feet thick at the top, which will be one foot lower than the

top of the bank. The water will be carried off by two 50-inch pipes, which will be imbedde torical, the scenes being laid in 1720 at in a masonry jacket two feet thick al round the pipes. Each of these dis charge pipes will have two gates, the gate-house for which will be situated below the dam. These pipes will discharge the immense quantity of be-tween 250,000,000 and 300,000,000 gallons in twenty-four hours

The dam will co 185,540 cubi yards of embankment and 12,500 cubic yards of stone. It will have a capacity of some 70,000,000 gallens more than the Mill Creek dam. When this and the Mill Creek dams will have beer completed, the Spring Brook Water Supply company will have nineteer dams. The present aggregate capacity of all the dams is very nearly four billions of gallons, and when Gardner's Creek and Mill Creek dams will hav been constructed the grand total capacity will be about five and one-half billions.

# VITAL STATISTICS

# FOR THE YEAR 1897 SHERIFF'S BALE

Examination of the Figures Reveal Some Interesting Facts.

### CITY'S DETAILED MORTALITY RECORD

The Rule That Figures Make Dry Reading Doesn't Apply to a Condition of Scranton's 1,822 Deaths Just Closed .- Particulars of Sex. Age, Disease and Seasons Are Revealed .- Work of the Food Inspector During the Year.

Figures make dry reading and when added to facts and records about death and disease are not usually calculated to make the average newspaper reader very cheerful. In connection with the yearly mortality record of the city for 1897, however, figures, facts and records are woven into quite an inter-

esting bit of information.

According to the board of health's vital statistics for last year 1,822 deaths were recorded. Of this number 54 occurred outside the city, the bodies being brought here for interment. In tabulating the particulars as to sex, cause of death, etc., the records make no distinction between foreign deaths and those within the city limits. Of the 1,822 deaths 1,552 were from natural causes, 131 from violence, 72 still births and 13 premature births. July and September respectively were the most fatal and least fatal months, the deaths being 179 and 129.

The records show that 939 deaths were of males and 803 females and 80 were not stated. The heading "social conditions" indicated that 622 were married, 1,039 single, 75 widows, 39 widowers. Of the 1.822, 983 were natives of the United States, 253 of Ireland, 175 of Wales, 134 of Germany, 77 of Russia and Poland, 37 of England, 27 of Hungary, 21 of Italy and 16 of Scotland.

An interesting comparison of ages may be made: 420 were under one year, 317 from 1 to 5 years, 306 from 20 to 40 years, 271 from 40 to 60 years, 247 over 60 years, 98 from 5 to 10 years, 79 from 10 to 20 years and 84 at ages not

#### LARGEST DEATH RATE.

The largest number of deaths in any one ward was 150, in the Fourth. There were 128 in the Second, the Nineteenth 122, the Fifth 116, the First and Sixth 98, the Eleventh 97, the Twentieth 8., the Fourteenth \$2, the Sixteenth 65, the Eighth 62, the Thirteenth 58, the Twelfth 53, the Seventh 51, the Seventeenth 47, the Twenty-first 37.

Of the burials 580 were in Hyde Park Catholic cemetery, 353 in Washburn street cemetery, 167 in Forest Hill cemetery and 109 in Dunmore cemetery and 287 were taken outside the city. The diseases which caused 40 or more

deaths each were as follows: Apoplexy 45, bronchitis 54, cholera infantum 62, convulsions (infantile) 132, croup (membraneous) 45, debility 10, diphtheria 67, heart diseases (various) 90, meningitis (various) 55, marasmus (infantile) 41, pneumonia (various) 191, phthisis pulmonalis (consumption of the lungs) 70.

The most common causes of deaths by accident were: Mine 15, severe burns 12, railroad 12, shock 16, suffocation 7, drowning 4, asphyxia 5, fractured spine 4, fractured skull 4, aractured vertebra 5, poison 4, suicide 5. Of births there were 1,405, of which 727 were males and 678 females. April was the banner month with 168 births and November took last place with

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES. According to physicians' reports of contagious diseases there were 1409 of measles, 443 of diphtheria, 96 of scarlet fever, 38 of typhoid fever, 18 of whooping cough, 8 of membranous croup and 1 each of diphthertic croup and chicken pox. a total of 2,014. Measles were most prevalent in April when 528 cases were reported. There were 414 in May, 224 in March, 107 in February and 38 in January, only 98 being reported during from June to December inclusive. During no month of the year did fewer than 16 cases in July or more than 56 cases in June of
