

ENCOURAGEMENT FROM CLEVELAND

He Advises the Sound Money Democrats to Get Together.

FATHERLY ADVICE TO KICKERS

He Believes that the Gold Bug Element of Democracy Can Make a Showing by Hard Work in Pennsylvania - Wants to Be Blessed With Safe Money.

Philadelphia, March 4.—Representatives of the national organization of the Jeffersonian and gold Democratic party met in the Hotel Walton today and resolved in favor of putting in the field a ticket of their own for state officers, from the governorship down and for members of congress in every district.

My Dear Mr. Foranhar: Your letter is received and I hope most sincerely that there may be a sound money movement in Pennsylvania that will be strong and useful. I cannot account for the arrogant confidence of the true silver forces except upon the theory that they are led to believe that there is very little against them and that they can be made by their opponents. It is a strange thing that the apparent anxiety in many of our sound money states should give place to such a belief. If any one believing with us supposed that free silver can be prevented from controlling the two houses of the next congress without the active organization and hard work, the quicker he abandons that idea the more useful he will be to our cause.

An outline of an address to be circulated throughout the state was agreed upon. It is to the effect that the gold Democrats of the state should at an early day take the steps necessary for making the nominations. An executive committee of fifteen was appointed to distribute the addresses and arrange for the nominating conventions and otherwise carry out the purposes of the meeting.

DAUNTLESS EXPEDITION.

Mr. Nunez Claims to Have Landed 700,000 Bullets.

Philadelphia, March 4.—Emilie Nunez, the promoter of Cuban filibustering expeditions who has just returned to his home in this city from his recent trip to Cuba on the filibustering steamer "Dauntless," was today shown the Washington dispatch which stated that Senor du Bose, the Spanish charge d'affaires, had informed the state department that the Dauntless expedition was not successful and had failed to effect a landing.

Mr. Nunez shrugged his shoulders after the dispatch had been read to him and remarked that it is just as well that the Spanish authorities shall have that opinion regarding the Dauntless expedition, but evidently becoming more interested in the topic he continued "My last expedition was into Cuba 700,000 bullets located at the end of 700,000 Mauser cartridges. And every one of these bullets is now being used to let daylight into the Spaniards who think as Senor du Bose thinks. If Senor du Bose knows as much about my recent expedition as the Spanish authorities in Havana know about the destruction of the Maine, and if Senor du Bose says that expedition was a failure, as the Havana authorities say, let him blow up on her own account, then Senor du Bose is of the same stripe as the authorities in Havana. He is a liar."

TELL-TALE TRAIL OF BLOOD.

It Led to a Cellar Where Thieves' Booty Was Hidden.

Shamokin, Pa., March 4.—Mrs. Flora James, discovering this morning that her poultry yard had been raided, notified the police, who traced blood drippings three squares to George Henry's house. In the cellar was found a lot of headless poultry, and miscellaneous articles of every description that were identified by persons whose homes had recently been burglarized.

WOULD NOT SHOW HIS TEETH.

A Man Supposed to Be Adam Weaver Resisted Inspection.

Stroudsburg, Pa., March 4.—A suspect supposed to be Adam Weaver, the Bucks county murderer, was captured at Bear Creek in the Pocono mountains late last night. The capture was made by Dr. Blecker, John Schock and George Dorschner, of Effort, who lodged their prisoner at Warner's hotel, which was closely guarded by a large force of men.

DEATH IN A SALOON.

Reading, March 4.—Joseph Manger, who was injured at the saloon of ex-judge Charles M. Ludwig, died today at the residence of Mrs. Louise Garman, with whom he lived. In view of the death of Manger, Alderman Kirschman committed Ludwig and William M. Richards to jail. They are accused of being responsible for Manger's death. The charge is manslaughter.

ETNER ACQUITTED.

Philadelphia, March 4.—The jury in the case of Charles Etner, a former member of the Pennsylvania legislature, on trial for issuing bogus naturalization papers, today notified Judge Butler that they were satisfied upon a verdict that the case will be tried again at the next term of court.

Gentner Jury Disagrees.

Philadelphia, March 4.—Henry P. Etner, formerly a clerk in the Lancaster, Pa., postoffice, was acquitted in the United States district court today of the charge of robbing the mail. Etner was Etner's second trial; the first jury having disagreed.

Death from an Explosion.

Dubois, March 4.—The first death from yesterday's mine explosion here occurred today when Garfield Rhodes, a 17-year-old boy, succumbed. Edward Cryer, another of the victims, will probably die. The other four victims will recover.

McCOY'S QUICK WORK.

In Two Rounds He Disposed of Nick Burley.

Hot Springs, Ark., March 4.—Kid McCoy knocked out Nick Burley in the second round here today. The fight took place at Whitington park, in the open air. The weather was fine.

There were 1,200 spectators, including about twenty-five ladies. The seconds for McCoy were Dock Payne, Bill Layton and Tom Galvin; the seconds for Burley were Jack Grace, Fred Campbell and Paddy O'Toole; timekeepers, Aldermen Carberry, of Chicago, for Burley; George Forbes, of Cleveland, for McCoy. Official timekeeper, Captain H. C. Price, of Hot Springs.

McCoy entered the ring at 12:30 p. m. with his seconds amid loud cheering. He was followed at 12:34 by Burley and his seconds, and the cheers were divided. The men stripped at 12:35. The going sounded at 12:40.

First round—McCoy lands and lands left. Burley heads and misses; clinch. Sparring for an opening. McCoy the aggressor. McCoy lands left on jaw and stops a left lunge; Burley counters with a left hand hook. McCoy forces Burley across the ring. Burley lands a heavy right on the heart. An exchange of blows and clinch; McCoy puts three lefts in Burley in quick succession. Burley lands a left and McCoy a right; clinch. McCoy lands a right on the heart and swings on the mouth. McCoy's first blood. Burley swings but McCoy ducks. The round ends in a rally; McCoy cool and confident; McCoy's round.

Second round—McCoy leads and misses. Both land. McCoy lands on McCoy's jaw. Burley going. McCoy leads with left and full shot, then lands a left on the jaw. Burley bleeding badly from the mouth; McCoy making Burley lead the fighting. Burley swings short with left. McCoy plants his left on the stomach and repeats the dose twice. Burley very groggy. Burley swings with his left but lands right on McCoy's shoulder. No damage. McCoy retreats; both fighting like demons. McCoy feints with left and follows with a heavy right on Burley's jaw. Burley counted out. Time of last round one minute and forty seconds.

THEIR SOLDIER FATHER ALIVE.

Reunited to Daughters Who Thought He Died in War.

Bloomfield, N. J., March 4.—Martin G. Nalls, a war veteran, who was once sentenced to death in a southern prison, was reunited with his two daughters yesterday in the Mountaineer hospital. For many years the daughters believed that their father had been killed in the war and their mother died from grief caused by the news. While visiting in Newark recently the daughters heard that their father was alive, and after considerable search found him.
