

KLONDIKE CADETS READY TO START

Only Waiting for the Sailing Day of Their Ship.

PARAPHERNALIA BEING PACKED

Druggist Vetter's Party Has Its Arrangements All Made and Will Leave Here One Week from Next Monday—Who Comprise the Party and Some of the Main Features of Their Plans—Some Talk of Returning in Eighteen Months.

Two weeks from yesterday will witness the departure of Scranton's Klondike colony, more familiarly known as Vetter's Klondike cadets.

While the newspaper paragrapher has been quietly but determinedly making their preparations and now they are only waiting for the sailing day of the ship which is to carry them to fortune and rigidity—surely one if not the other.

According to present calculations the party will number possibly eighteen, probably eleven, likely nine and barring unforeseen obstacles, assuredly, eight.

The eight who are put up their own rata assessment as an earnest of their intention to go are: P. J. VETTER, druggist Penn avenue; ADAM KILLACK, carpenter, Beech street; SAMUEL RINGSDORF, ex-hotel keeper, 124 South Lincoln; and the fortunate FRANCIS E. EHROGOD, blacksmith, Duane.

ALBERT GIBNER, engineer, La Plume; GEORGE H. SUTHERLAND, machinist, Pittston; JOHN SWIFT, prospector, M. Pocono; and W. J. MINE FOREMAN, Peconic, N. Y.

The dashes represents a member of the party, who for some reason not made known, desires that his name should not appear in the papers in this connection, until after he has started, at least.

TOOLS, CLOTHING, ETC. The rear room of Mr. Vetter's drug store is already assuming the appearance of a young warehouse.

Boxes and barrels and cans, containing tools and medicines and clothing and the like are piled up, and more consignments of these and like articles are coming in every day.

A force of pulling teeth and celluloid eye-protectors to guard against driving snow in the winter and mosquitoes in the summer which are among the paraphernalia give an idea of the attention which the party has given to details.

A sectional hand drill, with two bits and 49 feet of pipe, to be used in prospecting is on hand and has been tested in Mr. Vetter's back yard.

The underclothing, chambray vests, Martin rifles, Colt revolvers, magnifying glasses, scales and such like have also been purchased here and are in the boxes in the back room on their way from New York.

What other tools are needed, together with the provisions which will be carried at Seattle. The party goes as a co-partnership. The expenses are paid out of a common fund and whatever they make is to be divided share and share alike.

They even go so far as to agree that if anything should happen to any of the party his family should be cared for by the other members of the party.

There is also a provision in the agreement that any man found guilty of playing his fellows false by securing gold or the like, he shall forfeit all claim upon the company and be drummed out of camp.

The expedition will leave here Monday, March 21, going by way of the Delaware and Hudson to Pittston, thence via the Lehigh Valley to Buffalo and thence across the continent by the Grand Trunk to Seattle.
