THE CHARGE BY JUDGE WOODWARD

Carciul and Comprehensive Review of the Evidence in the Case -- Many Points of Law Are Explained by the Court -- The Duties of a Sheriff in Case of Emergency Are Defined. What Constitutes Rtol.

Wilkes-Barre, March 8 .- The Martin trial entered upon its final stages today. When court opened ex-State Attorney General Palmer began his argument for the defense. He attacked in a sarcastic and cutting manner the various attorneys for the prosecution and going on with the body of his argument said there were three propositions in this case:

Pirst-That there was rioting in and around Hazleton from the third to the tenth of last September. Second-That Sheriff Martin was called to Hazleton to suppress this

rioting Third-That the mob which marched to Lattimer was riotous, law-breaking and disorderly.

Mr. Falmer took up each of these points in detail and went over them, spending mest of the time over the He argued that if the jury believed the sheriff had given, by direct command or previous instruction, the order to fire, then the deputies could not be found guilty of any crime, as they obeyed the order of their superfor officer, who was the supreme power at the time. He had the right to judge, and to execute, and could no more be held responsible for any possible mistake than could the judge on the bench whose decision is reversed by the supreme court, be held responsible.

If you find that the strikers were riotous, that they refused to obey the orders of the sheriff; that the sheriff's life, or the deputies' lives were in danger, then the shooting was justified and neither the sheriff nor the depu-tics can be held."


"The charge," he said, "is the murder of Mike Coslak, but the charge cannot he substantial unless we find the man who killed him. One shot, from me gun, fired by one man, killed Mike Coslak. Who fired that shot? No one knows-no one but God. Then why are the sheriff and deputies here?"

Mr. Palmer dealt particularly with the law points in the case and finished District Attorney Martin then com-

menced the final address for the commonwealth

JUDGE WOODWARD'S CHARGE. It was after 4 o'clock when District Attorney Martin concluded his address. Judge Woodward immediately began his charge to the jury. It was very lengthy but showed much care in preparation. After defining the various degrees of murder his honor said:

"It now becomes our duty, gentlemen of the jury, to direct your attention to this question. Was there, in what is known as the Hazleton region, just prior to the tenth of September, 1897, such a state of disorder and such a danger of riot involving destruction of life and property, as to justify the action of the sheriff in calling out the posse comitatus. The answer to this question must be made by you in the light of the right and wrong as well as by the



the authority of the sheriff has been exhausted in an unsuccessful effort to maintain the peace. The sheriff may avail himself of the services of military organizations. He may order them into his posse, not as soldiers, but as citizens trained and disciplined for effective service in critical emergencies. The posse comitatus signifies the whole

power of the county, and all ablebodied male persons over the age of 15 years may be summoned to act as members of it. To disobey the sum-mons of the sheriff is to be guilty of misdemennor, and may subject the offender to the punishment of fine and imprisonment.

WHAT CONSTITUTES RIOT.

"We have a statute in Pennsylvania passed in 1795, entitled 'An Act Against Riots and Rioters;' it reads as follows: "If any persons to the number of

three, shall meet together with clubs stones, or any other hurtful weapons to the terror of any of the peaceable people or inhabitants of this province and shall commit or design to commit violence or injury upon the person or goods of any of the said inhabitants and shall be convicted thereof, such persons shall be reputed and punished as rioters according to the law of England: and such act of terror or violence

or design of violence shall be deemed and accounted a riot."

"And the definition in the English law, is this: 'Where three or more actually do an unlawful act of violence either with or without a common cause of quarrel, or even to do a lawful act in a violent and tumultuous manner." 'It is not my purpose in this charge to enter upon any extended discussion of what are known as strikes, or the right of laboring men to form them-

selves into organized bedies for the purpose of securing better compensation for their labor. I shall content myself with a brief statement of the law as I find it to be in the statute, and the adjudicated cases. And we say to you, gentlemen, that there is no law

The question whether the purpose of the cannot be fairly answered, without a comprehensive review of all the facts and occurrences which led up to, and

culminated in the final volley fired by the deputies on that day, and which resulted in the death of the person named in the indictment. The events of the week preceding the 10th are so knit together in the fabric of the case that they cannot be considered an entirely independent and separate transactions, but must be regarded as constituting together the history of the case. If the sheriff became satisfied after a careful examination of the sit. uation in and about Hazieton, that the public peace was threatened, that the people were terrorized, and there was danger of riot, if the demonstrations of the men engaged in the strike were allowed to proceed, he had the right, as the chief officer of the county, to summon a posse to assist him in the preservation of order, and in the prevention of riot. For it cannot be doubted that the duty of a sheriff is to prevent the danger, as well as to suppress a riot, which has become flagrant and destructive. Leaving out of view all the facts on this branch of the case which are controverted, and in reference to which the witnesses differ, it | certainly true that both at West Hazleton and at Lattimer, the great body of the strikers failed to obey the sheriff when he ordered them to disperse and insisted in pushing on. Nor can it be doubted that the sheriff had the right, in the exercise of the discretion vested in him by the law, to issue the order. And if it was the right of the sheriff to command the crowd to disperse, then it was the duty of the crowd to obey his command. The right to give the order implies the duty of obedience to the order, and disobedience of it is evidence of a riotous purpose. If I push on when the sheriff or-
