CAPTAIN SAMPSON ILL.

The Spanish divers avoid the noonday heat working in the morning and evening. Two divers were examined by the American court of inquiry today as to their recent observations at the wreck. The work of wreckage appears very slow. If any real progress is made it is scarcely apparent from day to day. Still, it is hoped that when the upper debris has been removed to the barge more bodies will be recovered. It may be, however, that the last body retaining a shape recognizable as human has been removed from the Maine. Chaplain Chidwick today, from descriptions in enlistment papers, identified two bodies that were buried at Colon cemetery together some days ago as those of Joseph I. Gordon and Johnson, both colored.

The officers and men of the Montgomery are still refused shore leave. They devote much time to drill and setting up exercises, the latter exciting much interest, especially to the sailors on the Spanish ships, where the tactics are quite different.

Consul General Lee called today on Commander Converse of the Montgom-The congressional tourists are likely to remain ten days or a fortnight, as the health regulations would prevent an earlier departure even if desired.

Ten o'clock tomorrow morning has been fixed for the call of ceremeny on General Blanco. There is official authority for the statement that the Spanish court of inquiry will make its decisions public as soon as reached.

SPAIN AWAKENING.

Political and Financial Circles Re-

slize the Gravity of the Situation. Madrid, March 10.-Political and financial circles here now fully realize that Spain is facing a grave problem. States, it is undersood, the Spanish government has completely changed its policy toward Cuba, and is now moving the co-operation of the Cuban constitution party, urging the maintenance of the volunteers and the pushing of the campaign against the insurgents thus given the military polfcy predominance over diplomacy. This change is due to the fear that the Radical Autonomists insisted upon the disarmament of the volunteers or incited the Constitutionalists to disaffection, a conflict would supervene, "affording the United States an opportunity for an armed intervention. The presence in Madrid of the Span-

ish ambassador to France, Senor Leon Castillo, has started rumors to the effect that Sener Gullon, the Spanish minister for foreign affairs, is about to resign and that he will be replaced by Senor Castillo. This is, however, denied in official circles, where it is said the visit of Senor Castillo is connected with the government's negotiations to obtain the support of France and Russia, which is favored by all parties, including the Carlists and Republicans, as there is a general feeling that in the event of war the radical and commercial interests of Great Britain will impel her to side with the United States. It is understood that the first effect of the understanding with France will be that Spain will receive financial assistance in order to avert her national bankruptcy.

Senor Sagasta, the premier, denies the rumors of ministerial changes. He "The responsibilities of power under present conditions are certainly not agreeable, but all the ministers regard it as a question of honor to re-

main at their posts." Senor Leon Castillo, the Spanish ambassador to France, will soon return to

Senor Gullon declared to a journalist that after President McKinley's declaration no importance should be attached to the arrival of the Montgomery at Havana. ESTIMATE OF THE VISCAYA. As an indication of the estimate put pon the Viscaya and the Almirante Oquendo, sister ships, by naval offi-cers here, a remark of one of them made today is worth reporting. The officer was standing with this correspondent on the quay watching the Viscaya as she swung with the tide. "Yes." he observed quietly, "she is a beautiful ship, but too big a mark. The Iowa, for instance, could not miss her with a single shot at reasonable fighting range, and would be likely to blow her boilers out in the first ten minutes." The same officer said: "The Pelayo is a really formidable battleship, but smaller and less dangerous than our Massachusetts.'

There is some talk here to the effect that the American government has arranged for laying a cable from Key the best rendezvous for the fleet, since the largest ships are able to coal there

in all sorts of weather. Henri Lane, the newspaper correscondent, was not compelled to leave accompanied by alleged full proof furnished to the Autonomic government by Senor Bruzon, governor of Havana province, that he and others were involved in the conspiracy responsible for locating 25 dynamite bombs at various points in Havana. Furthermore, they contended that not all the correspondents should be under the ban, but that selections should be made of the guilty. They concluded their reply to Senor Bruzon by saying that it would be unwise to expel any correspondents while the court of inquiry was in session, lest it would seem that the Spaniards dreaded the publication of the truth about the Maine explosion. They demanded additional written charges, with proofs, from Senor Bruzon. This was four days ago and nothing has been forthcoming. 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
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
