STATE FINANCES.

Report of Bank Commis-

sioner Gilkeson. Harrisburg, March 11.-The annual report of Bank Commissioner Gilkeson or the fiscal year ended Nov. 30, 1897, the advance seets of which have just been issued, shows the capital stock of the various financial institutions in the state under the control of the department to be \$46,691,159.17. The total surplus is \$25,673,125.52. There is a total under the head of undivided profits of \$17,402,589.05. Under the head of deposits, however,a big increase is shown, the total being \$239,083,745.94, an increase of \$25,419,288.59 as compared with the year before.
