

SPLENDID MUSIC IN THE CHURCHES

Easter Festival Will Be Observed in all the Houses of Worship.

EXTENSIVE PREPARATIONS MADE

Some of the Elaborate Programmes That Have Been Arranged and Which Will Be Heard in the City Churches Tomorrow--There Will Be Augmented Choirs and in Many Cases Orchestras Will Play the Accompaniment for the Singers.

Arrangements have been made for special services in all of the churches of the city tomorrow in honor of Easter. In almost every instance elaborate programmes of music will be rendered. Below some of them are given:
