Horace Greeley was not an orator in my scholastic sense. He had a poer and somewhat squeaking voice; he knew nothing of gestures, and he could not take an orator's pose, which adds such emphasis sometimes to the matter and argument to be set forth. Not all his years of practice on the platform and on public occasions ever changed his habits and methods as a speaker, and he ended as poorly equipped in the respects named for the vocation as when he began. But he had one prime quality without which all the others are exploited in vain. He invariably had something to say, and he saul it ir such clear and wholesome English. with such sincer, ry, that he was an rater in spite of all the rules.
