MAKING PAPER WATERPROOF. It is said that the paper used by the Japanese for making umbrellas is made waterproof by giving it a few coats of chromated gelatine. This product some years ago was used exclusively in photolthography, but new uses have in the meantime been constantly springing up for it. It is made by adding one part of chromic acid to fifty parts of glue or relatine, and upon exposure to the aunlight it becomes absolutely insoluble even in boiling water.
