

MINING AND METALLURGY.

From the Philadelphia Record.

Last year's American product of Bes-somer steel ingots was 5.475.315 tons (the largest on record), against 2.910.906 tons in 1896. The production of Bossemer steel rults was 1.614.389 tons, against 1.102.893 in 1896, and 2.044.819 in 1887, which still

A Californian, by a special process, has succeeded in solidifying petroleum into a bluck, solid mass, which burns like coal, with less smoke, and throws out infrice the heat. It can be cast in bricks, clean and gives out little petroleum oder.

A magnetic survey is to be made of Prussia, on whose coast regions magnet-le measurements have been carried out by the Imperial naval authorities. The stations will be 24 miles apart, and the cost \$12,500.

A German engineer has been appointed superintendent of the Imperial Japanese steel works at Kluschlu, with a salary of \$20,000 and the appointment is considered indicative of the purchase in Germany of all the machinery needed for the works.
