Common Council Blds the Measure Adieu on Third Reading.

PLUMBING INSPECTOR'S SALARY

Two Ordinances, One an Amendment to the Present Measure Creating the Office and Another Providing Sainty Funds, Introduced and Referred for Printing -- New Board of Revision and Appeal Soon to Be Elected -- A Batch of New Measures.

Committee Last Night Cut Nearly \$20,000 from 1898 Estimates.


