ton Iron Fence company and Ambrose Herz for removing the old buildings on the site of No. 2 school, Pittston avenue. The former offered to do the work for \$75 and the latter \$150. The matter was referred to the building committee who requested more time to consider the matter.

The pay rolls for janitors and officers were reported and approved. The attorney for the board reported favorab ly on the bonds and surety of delin-quent tax collectors Thomas J. Langan, of the Thirteenth ward, and C. Bedford Reynolds, of the Seventeenth

ward. Attorney Reedy notified the board that an application was made to court yesterday restraining the board from making the tax levy or incurring any indebtedness by purchasing lots, etc. The rule is returnable on Monday next. LESS THAN OTHER YEARS. You will notice that the amount appropriated for building purposes is less than that for the previous years. It is believed the district can accommodate with some effort the increasing school population and the necessities of the different wards by the erection of not more than two buildings. We believe it wise at this time to pay the deficit of the past year, estimated to be \$23,000, economy being exercised in every direction by the district, rather than to greatly increase our facili-ties. Your committee would also very earnestly recommend that every effort be made on the part of the committees, the officers and the employes to keep their expenditures within the limit set by your

For the purpose of paying the interest on the bonded debt and for sinking fund purposes, your committee recommended a levy of 1.43 mills on the valuation of \$22.

This will produce a revenue of \$12,175 (the amount required for this purpose is \$12,000). For building purposes your com-mittee would recommand a tax levy of

3.32 mills on valuation of \$22,500,000; this will yield \$74,780.


