WOULD CAPTAIN TUCKER TELL A LIE? His Story Regarding the Condition of Havana is Regarded With Suspicion--Two Hundred Spanish Cavalry Were Seen Patrolling the Cuban Coast--News from Matanzas, Cardenas and Mariel is Meagre.

Key West, April 27.--The capture of the Spanish steamer Panama, with her rich cargo, by the Mangrove, is the best prize expected in these waters for many a day. When the achievement became known on the New York loud cheers broke from the crowded decks.

Intense satisfaction is felt among the officers of the New York over the capture for a vigilant lookout has been kept during the last few days, and to-night some feared that the Panama might have slipped into Havana. Her value is great, quite apart from the trinkets worth of the hull and cargo.

The first news from Havana reached the squadron this evening when the British steamer Luceline was stopped by the flagship. The Luceline is commanded by Captain Tucker. She sails from London and was bound from Havana for Bermuda and Philadelphia.

CHIEFS FOR MARBLE. After a careful inspection Lieutenant Marble left the Luceline. Three cheers were given as she went over the side. It is the opinion of this command that very little reliance can be placed upon Captain Tucker's story.
