Key West, April 27 .- The capture of the Spanish steamer Panama, with her rich cargo, by the Mangrove, is the best prize expected in these waters for many a day. When the achievement became known on the New York loud cheers broke from the crowded decks. The Mangrove, which was going to Key West for coal, ran right into the Spaniard, which endeavored to get away. The Indiana was signalled by the flagship and joined in the chase, but apparently the chief glory belongs to the Mangrove.

Intense satisfaction is felt among the officers of the New York over the capture, for a vigilant lookout has been kept during the last few days, and tonight some feared that the Panama to the blockade if the provisions which she carried had been taken into Ha-

The first news from Havana reached the squadron this evening when the British steamer Luceline was stopped by the flagship. The Luceline is commanded by Captain Tucker. She hails from London and was bound from Havana for Bermuda and Philadelphia. She has about 200 Cubans, men, wo-men and children, on board, beside a eargo of horses and sugar. She is the first boat known to have left Havana since last Friday, when the blockade was commenced. She was seen coming out from El Morro about 5 p. m., and was about six miles from land before the New York started on her trail. Smoke poured from the flagship's smokestacks as she rushed through the calm water to cut off the stranger, who was also going at a good pace. Lieutenant Marble was sent on board by Captain Chadwick. Captain Tucker gave satisfactory proofs of the Luceline's identity, He said that the people in Havana did not know that war was in progress. The English consul general, Mr. Gollan, had said nothing to him, so Captain Tucker alleged, about the war, or the blockade. When asked what explanation was given in Havana for the appearance of American ships outside El Morro, Captain Tucker said he had not bothered his head about it, and had not heard anyone talking on the subject. There were no evidences, he continued, of starvation in the city of Havana. His Cuban passengers-many f them children in arms-were getting out of Havana, "on general principles." He had heard that more mines vere to be laid in the harbor. Captain Tucker declared that he had not read any of the Havana papers.

CHEERS FOR MARBLE.

After a careful inspection Lieutenant Marble left the Luceline. Three cheers eere given as he went over the side. It is the opinion of this cor, espondent that very little reliance can be placed upon Captain Tucker's story. About two hundred Spanish cavalry

were seen on the beach about fifteen miles from El Morro this afternoon, The flagship was lying at no great distance from the shore and they were within easy range; but no shots were fired. It is believed the Spanish cavalry is establishing a patrol to pre-vent a repetition of such incidents as the Perter landing Monday night. The Ill Morro batteries were believed to be firing at something at about 5 p. m.; but it was impossible to ascertain definitewhether this was so or not.

The Wilmington captured the tiny schooner Sol of Sagua, with a cargo of ugar, but let her go, after being careful to see that she went in a direction opposite to Havana.

The news from Matanzas, Cardenas and Mariel is meagre; but it indicates that the blockade has been firmly established at these ports. The torpedo boat Poote is reported as having been fairly on the Matanzas batteries; but thus far not a single casualty of any kind in the fleet has been heard of on the flag-

Lieutenant Juan del Pino of the Spanish infantry and his orderly were brought on board the flagship yesterday morning from the gunboat Wilmington, to whom they had been turned over by the cruiser Cincinnati. HOUSE DEBATFS ON REVENUE SCHEMES

A Singular Absence of Partisan Rancor is Noticed.

THE METHODS OF RAISING FUNDS

Various Schemes Proposed Meet With Opposition .- The Bond Section Brcomes Target for Democratic and Populistic Elequence -- Mr. Dolli ver, Iown, Makes the Most Notable

Washington, April 27.-The general debate upon the measure framed by the ways and means committee to mee the extraordinary expenditures of the war with Spain opened in the house today. It will continue through tome row, and on Friday at 4 o'clock the vote will be taken. There was a signal absence of the partisan rancor which has always heretofore characterized debates of revenue measures. Both sides, speaking through their respective leaders, Messrs. Dingley and Pailcy, concurred in the necessity which existed for immediate raising of hundreds of millions to prosecute war, but the opposing doctrines which they held clashed on the first account over the methods by which the revenue should
