(Continued from Page 1) of the camp until sunrise tomorrow, when a salute of twenty-one guns will be fired. Governor Hastings, Secretary of War and Adjutant General also came to the camp at 5 o'clock this afternoon and after visiting General Snowden, returned to Harrisburg. As quickly as the various commands reached the grounds, their respective camps began to assume form, and in a few hours there had before been a big clearing, rows of white tents dotted the surface of the ground. This work had no sooner been completed than so many of the soldiers as could possibly get away, went into Lebanon and purchased extra supplies. There was such a demand for rubber boots that before dark it was hard to obtain any for love or money and the dealers were forced to send rush orders to the wholesalers for an extra shipment.

PATROLMAN HAWKES TO LEAVE THE FORCE

Patrolman John Hawkes, whose removal from the police force by the mayor has been pending in council, resigned. His resignation to take effect July 1, was submitted to Mayor Bailey yesterday afternoon.

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GUARD TRIUMPHANT.

The Soldiers of the Thirteenth Will Be Accepted as a Regiment. Companies Must Be Increased. Harrisburg, April 28.-Secretary of War Alger has advised Governor Hastings that the Pennsylvania National Guard as now constituted will be mustered into the United States service. The only change will be an increase in the membership of the infantry and cavalry companies to the maximum of eighty officers and men and the three batteries of artillery to 116 officers and men each. The guard will enter the volunteer service with its present line and staff officers. General orders are being prepared giving the details for the mustering in of the troops. The order will also state that membership in the guard does not make it imperative on either officers or men to enlist in the United States service.

CONVENTION OF REBEKAHS.

In connection with the state convention of Odd Fellows at Wilkes-Barre next month the Daughters of Rebekah will hold their convention in Memorial hall May 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20. THIRTEEN VIEWERS APPOINTED.

They Will Lay Out a New Road in Benton Township. George Perry, of Waverly; A. E. Seimons, of LaPlume, and John H. Fellows, of this city, were appointed viewers yesterday by the court to lay out a new public road in Benton township. The appointment was made upon petition of a large number of residents of Benton. The proposed road will begin at a point near the residence of L. B. Stanton and will extend to the road leading to Factoryville at a point near where the latter road touches the Wyoming county line.

TRIBUTE TO MINISTER WOODFORD.

London Correspondent, N. Y. Sun. The time has arrived to pay a richly deserved tribute to the man who has been fighting for the American cause in Madrid for the past eight months in a manner of wit, perhaps, the unwilling respect and admiration of all Europe. The diplomats of the Old World are unable to understand the skill, tact, and energy which has enabled a man untrained in diplomacy to accomplish things which any one of them would have declared to be hopeless. The world's press never will know, probably, how much General Woodford did accomplish and against what odds. The diplomatic records do not tell a tithe of the revery. Known as I do, some of the difficulties he surmounted, some of the delicate situations he navigated, some of the great dangers he has undergone, all with marvellous patience, consummate skill, and loyal patriotism, I do not hesitate to say that America owes no greater debt of gratitude to any man than to its representative, whose name was stoned by a Spanish mob as he left their inhospitable country. Moreover, this is the only American in the American tribute. Every newspaper in Europe, without regard to its opinion of the merits of the American cause, has put, pays a tribute to General Woodford as a man who fulfilled a most difficult duty with dignity, and honor to himself and the country he represented.
