

the United States was completed today when General Gobin's regiments, comprising the Third brigade, were successively formed upon the field at Camp Hastings and each officer and man was asked individually for his answer. Five regiments, a battery and a cavalry troop comprises the brigade and made up a grand total of 2,723 officers and men on the field under arms. Inspector Morrell put the same question to them as he did to the other two brigades and Governor Hastings personally assured each officer answering "yes" that he would be commissioned in his present rank.

impressive and brought forth the same enthusiasm as the past two days, was over, it was found that 2,266 enlisted men, 133 company officers and 61 regimental officers had agreed to volunteer. But 258 enlisted men refused and five officers were unable to go. As near as can be approximated at


