The Associated Press Despatch heat TREPARTY ana, yosterday: At Matunzas a fornedo boat was spoken on her return westward from the flagship, to which she had carried despatches to Rear Adulral Sampson, which had arrived after the departure of the New York.

An officer of the Hornet says that yesterday morning the Spanishflag was raised over a lighthouse on a sand spit just and of the entrance of Matanzas, and he thinks two guns are mounted there. If this he correct, it is possible that, with the aid of her quick-firing six-pounders, the Hornet will very shortly be in possesion of the two Spanish guns and the lighthouse.
