RHEUMATISM THE MARKETS. Wall Street Review. New York, May 10.—The stock market was largely influenced again today by the wheat market, the movements in which unsettled the tone in all speculative markets.

Wheat market. The stock market during the early part of the day absorbed a very large line of offerings to liquidate profits and the selling for London accounts also heavily against. The general demand for stocks continued commission houses was sufficient to take up these offerings at a well sustained level of prices.

There was evidence also of the operation of bull pools here and there in the list notably of the low priced stocks which are usually bought, inactive and immobile. The strength imparted to these stocks helped to sustain the market and with the rallying opening weakness in the wheat market, there came a partial recovery.

The late decline was effected on a much smaller scale, but the market was absorbed in the morning dealing. Short selling by the bears was conspicuous. A slump of over 4 points in Tobacco also had its effect in the late weakness. There were a few scattered offerings before the close, which was firm at net losses of over a point in some cases.
