

The range grew closer and shells began to explode all about her.

It was difficult for the Hudson to get near enough to throw a line to the Winslow's crew, so terrible was the fire all about her.

EREN'S LAST WORDS. Ensign Bagley and six men were standing in a group on the deck of the Winslow.

"Don't miss it!" shouted an officer from the Hudson, and with a smile, Bagley called back.

"Let her come, it's getting too hot here for comfort." The line was thrown and at the same instant a shell burst in the very midst of the group of men on board the Winslow.

Ensign Bagley was instantly killed and a few others dropped about him. Half a dozen more fell groaning on the blood-stained deck.

"The torpedoes were disabled and help was called and swayed under the fury of the fire from the Spanish gunboats. When the shell burst in the group at the Winslow, a man who had about of triumph went up from the Spanish boats and uttered a shout of triumph.

Finally the Hudson succeeded in getting a line on board the Winslow and was towing her out of the deadly range when the line parted, and again both boats were at the mercy of the Spanish fire.

At 3.30 p. m. the Hudson managed to get another line on the deck of the Winslow, but there were only three men left there at that time to make it fast.

The line was finally secured and the Winslow was towed up to Pedro's Island, where she was anchored with her bow and stern on the pier.

Three men from the Hudson went on board the Winslow and took the most seriously wounded men off. Three of the latter were taken on board the gunboat Machias and died shortly after arrival.

At 5.15 p. m. yesterday the Hudson, with the dead bodies and some of the wounded, started for Key West, arriving here at 8 o'clock this morning.

COMMANDER BERNARD'S WOUNDS. Commander Bernard, of the Winslow, was wounded in the left leg but not seriously. Lying in the cabin of the Hudson this morning he told the story of the fight.

"We went into the harbor under orders. The torpedo boat Winslow was the worst injured. She had five of her men killed, and I don't know how many injured.

There in a rough wagon, still covered by the Stars and Stripes. The rude conveyance, was followed by a large crowd and all day long the doors of the shop were surrounded by large gatherings.

Naval officers, marines and sailors came there to look upon the faces of their dead comrades. Some of the bodies showed fearful wounds.

Ensign Bagley was literally torn to pieces. His body will be embalmed and shipped to his home.

Oliver Varves had his throat cut by a sharp piece of the shell, which apparently severed his windpipe as if slashed with a razor.

Fireman Daniels had his left shoulder ripped to pieces, the right side of his head torn open.

Fireman Tunnell, the colored cook, showed no wounds. Fireman Meeks was hurt in the groin.

It is now known that the American boats made furious havoc with the Spanish hidden torpedoes. The captain of the Hudson said: "I know we destroyed a large part of their town near the wharves, burned one of their gunboats, and I think, destroyed two other torpedo destroyers.

We were in a vortex of shot, shell and smoke, and could not tell accurately, but we saw one of their boats on fire and sinking soon after the action began. The large building near the wharf, I think the barracks—look fire and many other buildings were soon burning.

The Spanish had masked batteries on all points. The United Pacific, Denver and Gulf securities, Rock Island the cotton oil stocks and some of the high priced investment stocks were notably firm.

From yesterday and the market was extremely feverish and irregular all day. Total sales were \$2,000,000.
