the range grew closer and shells began to explode all about her. It was difficult for the Hudson to

get near enough to throw a line to the Winslow's crew, so terrible was the fire all about her. Finally, after try-ing for about twenty minutes, the Naval officers, marines and sailors Hudson approached near enough to throw a line.

### BAGLEY'S LAST WORDS.

Ensign Bagley and six men were standing in a group on the deck of the Winslow.

"Heave her! Heave her!" should Bagley, as he looked toward the commander of the Hudson and called for a line.

"Don't miss it!" shouted an officer from the Hudson, and with a smile, Bagley called back "Let her come. It's getting too hot here for comfort."

The line was thrown and, at the same

instant a shell burst in the very midst of the group of men on board the Win-

Ensign Bagley was instantly killed and a few others dropped about him. Half a dozen more fell groaning on the blood-stained deck. One of the dead men pitched headlong over the side of the boat, but his feet caught the iron roll and he was hauled back. Bagley lay stretched on the deck, with his face completely torn away and the upper part of his body shattered.

The torpedo boat, disabled and helpless, rolled and swayed under the fury of the fire from the Spanish gunboats. When the shell burst in the group on board the Winslow another wild shout of criumph went up from the Spanish boats and batteries and again a heavy fire was opening on the torpedo hoat,

Finally the Hudson succeeded in gettime a line on board the Winslow and was towing her out of the deadly range when the line parced, and again both outs were at the mercy of the Spanich hro

At 3.30 p. m. the Hudson managed to another line on the deck of the Winstow, but there were only three men left there at that time to make it


