

INTERVIEW WITH SENOR CAPOTE

Vice President of the Cuban Republic to Visit Washington.

WILL SET FORTH THE ASPIRATIONS OF THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT IN CONJUNCTION WITH SENOR PALMA—THE CUBANS DESIRE INDEPENDENCE OF THE UNITED STATES AS WELL AS OF SPAIN.

(Copyright, 1898, by the Associated Press.) Kingston, Jamaica, May 22.—Senor Mendez Capote, vice-president of the Cuban republic, who is on his way to Washington arrived here yesterday. With him were Senors Manuel Despuig, his private secretary; Alberto Tiera, military aide and Ornelo Nodarse, the controller general and commandant. They were taken off the Cuban coast, twelve miles east of Cienfuegos, on Tuesday night by the filibuster Captain Gerovasio Sotelo and his crew. The party consisted of a motor launch and a launch with a crew of ten men. They were nearly swamped several times. While journeying here from Montego Bay with an Associated Press correspondent, Senor Capote, after hearing two weeks' news and the truth regarding the Manila victory, said: "I go to Washington to set forth the aspirations of the provincial government in conjunction with Senor Palma. I cannot disclose the precise nature of the representations I shall make. Their object is to establish a firm understanding between the governments and to arrange a basis of cooperation in military designs, and a civil reorganization of the island. We feel immensely grateful to the United States for their aid. "The non-decisive character of the war so far is a little disappointing to us, but we know the American plans must be wise and certain in the end to effect the result we strive for. The result for us is not liberty alone but independence—Independence of the United States as well as of Spain."

IS WHALING FLEET LOST.

Sailor Brings News That Vessels at Point Barrow Are Destroyed. San Francisco, May 22.—The startling news was received here that the fleet of whaling vessels struck in the ice at Point Barrow, away up at the north end of Alaska, since last fall, is totally destroyed. The news was received here in a letter by way of Seattle. The letter, dated April 17, came from Hume Brothers, their agent, Charles Pfaff, at Karluk. Pfaff says the news of the wreck of the fleet was brought by a Norwegian sailor, who crossed Stokloff straits. Pfaff gives no details, but simply says the fleet is a total loss. He reports the loss of the sealing schooner Alexandria, which was carrying supplies to northern stations for the North American Commercial company. Mr. Hume says the meagreness of the news given by Pfaff was probably due to the fact that he just had time to catch some departing steamer. The last news from the fleet was brought by Third Mate Walker, of the steamer Orca, who crossed from Point Barrow to the Mackenzie river, and then struck down through the interior to Edmonton, making a terrible trip of thousands of miles over ice and snow, and undergoing great suffering. Walker brought news up to November 1, 1897, when he left his whalers camped near Point Barrow. The steamer Orca had been crushed in the ice and the Freeman burned, so that the fleet remaining in the ice was composed of the steamers Belvidere and Fearless, the steam tender Jennie, the schooner Teosiro and the bark Wanderer. All these vessels were fast in the ice, but Walker declared there should be no difficulty in their getting out as soon as the ice broke up in the spring. Mr. Hume thinks that the ice must have broken up suddenly, and great floes have crushed the imprisoned vessels before they could reach clear water. This disaster places 186 men in great peril, for if they did not save the stores from the ships they may run out of supplies before the relief expedition, under Lieutenant Jarvis, now on its way from St. Michaels, can reach them.

BRAVE BOYS HONORED.

Eastern Volunteers Are Given a Warm Welcome in California. San Francisco, May 22.—There were 10,000 enlisted men, 47 officers, gathered at the two military camps in this city this morning. The presidio reservation is the temporary home of nearly 5,000 men, including those from this state. Washington and Oregon, in fact, the camp is the headquarters of the Pacific coast men. The troops from Minnesota, Wyoming, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado are quartered on the site of the old bayonet race track covering about twelve squares. Each square will accommodate comfortably 1,000 men. This city of tents has been named Fort Richmond and shelters about 4,500 men. Both camps were visited today by thousands of people from the city. Every car and train brought its loads of sightseers. Hardly a visitor entered the camp empty handed, fruit, flowers and little boxes of delicacies formed the principal packages taken out for the soldiers, boys and many of the blue coated men were

made happy by these little evidences of good will. The soldiers express themselves as greatly pleased with the reception given them by the people of California. To every stopping place, they were deluged with flowers and good things to eat and drink. They are particularly grateful to the ladies of the Red Cross society of this city who took them in charge as they left the ferry boats and supplied them with hunches of hot coffee and lemonade, decorated their guns and haversacks with various kinds of California flowers, which at this season are quite plentiful. Many more troops will arrive from other sections during the next few days. The light artillery from Salt Lake will reach here tomorrow morning and the Utah cavalry is due to arrive on Tuesday at the same time as the Tenth Pennsylvania regiment. Seventy-five empty coaches were started back to Ogden last night to accommodate troops now on their way here from eastern points.
