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# **INTERVIEW WITH** SENOR CAPOTE

# Vice President of the Cuban Republic to Visit Washington.

WILL SET FORTH THE ASPIRATIONS OF THE PROVINCIAL GOVERN-MENT IN CONJUNCTION WITH SENOR PALMA-THE CUBANS DE-SIKE INDEPENDENCE OF THE UNITED STATES AS WELL AS OF SPAIN.

(Copyright, 1898, by the Associated Press.) Kingston, Jamalca, May 22 .-- Senor Mendez Capote, vice-president of the Cuban republic, who is on his way to Washington arrived here yesterday. With him were Senors Manuel Despalgue, his private secretary; Alberto Herra, military aide and Orenoio Nodarse, the controller generals and commandate. They were taken off the Cuban coast, twelve miles east of Ceinfuegos, on Tuesday night by the fillbuster Captain Gervasio Sablo and had a temptestuous voyage of two days in an open three ton sail boat. They were nearly swamped several times. While journeying here from Montego bay with an Associated Press corres-pondent Senor Capote, after hearing two weeks' news and the truth regarding the Manila victory, said;

'I go to Washington to set forth the aspirations of the provincial government in conjunction with Senor Palma. I cannot disclose the precise nature of the representations I shall make. Their object is to establish a firm understanding between the governments and to arrange a basis of cooperation in military designs, and a civil reorganization of the Island. We feel immensely grateful to the United Stars for their aid.

"The non decisive character of the war so far is a little dissappinting to us, but we know the American plans must be wise and certain in the end to effect the result striven for. That result for us is not liberty alone but independence-independence of the United States as well as of Spain."

San Francisco, May 22 .- There were 10,999 enlisted men, 474 officers, gather-Denald. ed at the two military camps in this city this morning. The presidio reservation is the temporary home of near 7,000 men, including those from this state, Washington, and Oregon, in fact, the camp is the headquarters of the cific coast men. The troops from Minnesota, Wyoming, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado are quartered on the site of the old bay district race track covering about twelve squares. Each square will accommodate comfortably 1,000 men. This city of tents has been named Fort Richmond and shelters about 4,500 men.


