

GENERAL MERRITT WILL GO LAST

General Greene to Lead the Second Manila Expedition. THE MEN PROUD OF THEIR COMMANDER—A SOLDIER, A DIPLOMAT AND AN AUTHOR—COURT MARTIAL IN CAMP—A CHRISTIAN COMMISSION WILL BE ORGANIZED.

San Francisco, June 7.—The men who will compose the second Manila expedition are pleased that Brigadier General Greene is to be their commander. Besides being a soldier he has a record as a diplomat and a manager of business enterprises. He has been decorated in Europe for bravery, is an author of repute and an active member of several scientific societies. It is surmised that his diplomatic experience will be of service to General Merritt in the government of the Philippines. The troops which will be under his command are the First Colorado volunteers, the Tenth Pennsylvania volunteers part of the Eighteenth and Twentieth United States infantry and either the Tenth or Twelfth United States artillery.

General Greene visited the camp of the Tenth Pennsylvania regiment and before making himself known to any of the officers of the regiment inspected the company streets, visited the cook tents, looked in at the guard house and examined the hospital. He then introduced himself to Colonel Hawkins and spent almost an hour in the camp, asking about the condition of the regiment, the health of the men, their proficiency in drill and the amount and kind of drilling to which they had been subjected. General Greene said that the Tenth would be his flagship, and that General Merritt would not accompany the second expedition.

Orders have been received at the Presidio for the Fourth United States cavalry to prepare for service in the Philippines. Colonel Merritt has been instructed to have six troops ready to go to Manila within two weeks. The cavalrymen are to take horses to the number of 400. If the animals are transferred without much loss and stand the climate in the islands another regiment of cavalry is to be sent on later, probably.

The court-martial appointed by Major General Otis has organized with Colonel G. B. Patton, First Nebraska, president, and Lieutenant Smith, Judge advocate. One of the most interesting cases that is to come before the court is that of John Campbell, the player in the Tenth Pennsylvania, who has been under arrest ever since the regiment left Ft. Greig, Pa., for cutting the breeches of a negro "striker," who belonged to Company C of the Pennsylvania regiment, which was then camped at Mt. Greig, Pa.

General Merritt has issued orders directing Company F of the Washington Volunteer regiment to go to Angel Island for garrison duty. It is only a temporary assignment as the company has been promised to go to Manila in case its regiment is ordered to that place.

The Methodists of the state will organize a Christian commission on a similar plan to the one which was in existence during the civil war. The object of the commission is to be the spiritual welfare of the soldiers in the Philippines. The Colorado, Nebraska, Pennsylvania and Minnesota men have been vaccinated and the men of the other regiments will be vaccinated as rapidly as the work can be done.

PHILIPPINE EXPEDITION Delayed on Account of Lack of Troop Ships. San Francisco, June 7.—There is much dissatisfaction in army circles over the delay in starting the third expedition to Dewey's relief. Assistant Secretary of War Melhobian comes out for criticism, it being charged that he is trying to handle the Cuban and Philippine expeditions to the disadvantage of both. General Merritt is chafing under the delay and complains of the slowness with which he is being supplied with transports.

TRANSPORTS WANTED. In an interview last night he said: "The want of transports is the crying want of the expedition. Twenty thousand men are to be sent to Manila. The Zealandia, China and China will carry only about 2,000. There are now on the way another three Pacific 2,500 troops, so you can easily see the situation. I do not wish to be understood as making any complaint of any criticism of the war department. I am merely making a statement of facts."
