Proposed Coal Carrying Road to Cross the Delaware.

The corps of engineers that is engaged in surveying the route for the new coal carrying railroad, proposed to be built by Scranton operators to duplicate on Saturday completed their preliminary survey of the line as far as the New Jersey shore of the Delaware river.

The line is now surveyed in an actuality center over the mountain through Appenzel and Solara and then in a deep gap touches Pen Angel and Ackermanville and crosses the river about half a mile below the Martin's Creek bridge.

Monday morning the surveying corps returned to the Scranton end to run the line a second time. It will have to be done over a third time before the line is continued across the state of New Jersey—Stroudsburg Times.
