#### Its a Case of Too Much Matrimony With William Davis.

HELD IN BALL IN THE SUM OF \$2,000 BY ALDERMAN LENTES TO AN-SWER CHARGES OF PERJURY AND BIGAMY-CONSTABLE WOELKERS IS THE PROSECUTOR-SURANTON ATHLETIC CLUB HAS DECIDED TO CONDUCT AN EXCURSION TO HAR-VEY'S LAKE.

William Davis, a young man whose home was until recent years at Tunkhannock, was arraigned before Alderman Lentes last evening on the charges of bigamy and perjury, preferred by Constable Joseph Woelkers of the Eleventh ward. He was held in \$2,000 bail which was furnished last evening by his brother-in-law, Jacob Geier The affair is an interesting one, it being the third time Davis has been arrested on the charge of bigamy. About six months ago Grace Smith, who claims she was married to him at Tunkhannock two years ago, had a warrant issued for Davis. He was held to bail, but before the sitting of the grand jury, an agreement was made between Davis and his wife, Grace Smith, and she did not appear and the case was ignored. Until recently he was permitted ti live with his second wife, who was a Miss Bonner, of Nicholson. They were married a year ago by the same clergyman and at the same place he took Miss Smith for better or worse.

Constable Woelkers had a bill against Davis for costs in the first case, and the latter made many promises to liquidate. His word was not fulfilled and with the consent of Mrs. Davis No. 1, Mr. Woelkers had a warrant issued Monday for the arrest of Davis on the charge of bigamy. 




