MURDERER KAISER AS A WITNESS

Called by Commonwealth in the Case Against Clemmer.

THE CONDEMNED PRISONER GIVES A THRILLING NAERATIVE OF THE ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR THE MURDER OF HIS WIFE-LIZZIE DE-KALE'S PART IN THE AFFAIR. PLACES THE BLAME ON CLEM-MER.

Norrislows, Pa., June 20,-Charles O. Kalser, is, who is under sentence of death for the murder of his wife, was today railed by the commonwealth as a witness against James A. Clemmer, who is on trial here charged with having been an accomplice in the crime The prosecution decided yesterday to resort to the unusual proceedings of placing a condemned murderer on the witness stand to testify against his alleged accomplice. Kaiser was brought into court handcuffed to the jail warden. After consulting with his attor-ney, George E. Carr, of Philadelphia, he took the stand. Mr. Kane, for the defence, objected to his being a witness, but the objection was overruled by Judge Weand, who explained that Kaiser was present under a writ of habens corpus, and that any testimony he would give must therefore he voluntary.

"I am here," said Kniser, "to tell the absolute truth and nothing else." Kalser, in answer to a question.stated that he met by appointment Clemmer and Miss DeKalb, who has figured sensationally in the case as the mysterious "woman in black," on the day of the murder at the railroad station in

Norristown. "What arrangements did you make for killing your wife?"

There were all kinds of arrangements made before this. Clemmer suggested that I should take my wife driving, and he would fellow us and shoot both of us. Lizzie DeKalb was there, too, and took part in this drama.

DETAILS OF THE TRACEDY.

"About 4.50 p. m. we went out, my wife and L. Clemmer got his team and followed us. I was in the wagon when he shot us. My wife said, 'Please don't shoct.'" As Kaiser said this he as he fold how Clemmer walked up and Fritsburg Batteric

There were no screams," he said, "I got out of the carriage and walked Heydler. towards the bridge. I took my clothes off, and Clemmer having failed to take my stud. I took it off and threw it away, but Clemmer promised to take all our lewelry and pocketbook."

"What did Lizzie DeKalb do?" "She had agreed, at the station, that she should turn the horse around, which she and Clemmer drove, and keep all passers by from coming up to us until after the shooting was done. which I suppose she did. She did not come near us after the murder."

Upon the suggestion of the counsel for the commonwealth, Kaiser told the following story:

"I met Clemmer and after a while he said that it would be a good plan Zimmer. Umpires-Lynch and Andrews. to have my wife's life insured, and then make away with her. mer came up and demanded our money and valuables. I handed him my pocketbook and my watch. My wife was just taking her watch off and was leaning over to remove the chain when Clemmer pointed the pistol at her. She said "Please don't shoot me," and then he fired. I agreed to let him shoot me in the arm, although I first agreed to let him shoot me in the head. I was afraid he would kill me also." Was Miss DeKalb present when you arranged to take your wife out for above Saturday's closing although te a drive?'

"Yes, she heard all about the plans, and went with Clemmer in the buggy which followed us." After further unimportant testimony Kalser was ordered back to jail, and

District Attorney Strassburger said: "The commonwealth rests." Immediately after Kabser had been ross-examined by Clemmer's counsel he was taken back to prison. The commonwealth here rested its case, and after a recess the defense opened. Clemmer's counsel went over the prisoner's life from his birth and declared that the prisoner's position today was the result of his meeting with Lizzle DeKalb. When he met her he began to take a downward road and deserted his wife and family. Before that he had led an upright life. Getting down to the murder counsel said he would be able to prove an alibl, not only for Clemmer but for Lizzle DeKalb as

well, and that they were elsewhere when the murder was committeed. During the afternoon the defense alled a number of witnesses, but the testimony was fragmentary and did not seem to prove conclusively that Clemmer was elsewhere. None could swear positively that Clemmer was not on the road on which the murder was committed on that night, but confined their statements to the fact that none of them saw him there. Court then adjourned until tomorrow, when Clemmer will take the stand. District Attorney Strassburger tonight said that Lizzie DeKalb will be permitted to plead guilty to being an accessory after the crime. The maximum punishment for this is two years.
