London, June 21 .- Up to this writing thirty bodies have been recovered at the scene of the disaster at the brunching of the hattleship Albien at Blackwell today. The victims were mostly working people on a holiday, who had espaired on the sinp building yard where the faunching took place. They roxided upon the staging from which they had been warned off, but the fore of pelice on the spot was inadequate to ontrol the immense crowd. Alout two hundred persons were thrown into the ange. 
