JENKS CERTAIN TO **BE THE NOMINEE**

De Lacey's Fate Depends on How Lackawanna Lines Up.

THE GALLANT CAPTAIN CAN HAVE THE NOMINATION FOR SECRE-TARY OF INTERNAL AFFAIRS IF 111S HOME DELEGATES WILL GET ABOARD THE GUFFEY BAND-WAGON-GUFFEY IS THE NEW PEBBLE ON THE SEACH-JOHN T. LENAHAN TO BE UNSEATED.

Altoona, Pa., June 28.-George A. Jenks, of Brookville, will be the nom-inee for governor of tomorrow's state Democratic convention unless there is a decided change of sentiment among the delegates before the nomination is made. His managers claim he will have 312 out of the 456 delegates and that under no conditions will Judge Gay Gordon, of Philadelphia, have more than 124. George W. Bacon, of York, has the call on the nomination for lieutenant governor, and Calvin M. Bower, of Center, will be one of the neminees for superior court judge. The make up of the rest of the ticket is in doubt and depends entirely on what conditions the Janks people can make with the friends of aspirants for minor places

A half dozen party leaders are working on a platform and it is doubtful if an agreement by reached before the resolutions committee gets togother tomerrow afterneon. The Bryan silver people control the convention and if they demand a sweeping endorsement of the Chicago platform, this will be done, although there is a disposition on all sides to make the compaign strictly on state issues with an emphatic endorsement of President Mc-Kinley's war policy.

FOR MINOR PLACES.

Ex-Congressman William H. Sowden, of Allentown, is making an active canvass for lieutenant governor. He says he is not identified with either faction and that he stands for himself. He can have the nomination for congress-at-large on the asking but he declares he does not want it.

A. V. Dively, of Altoona, is still in the field for second place with little prospect of success. Captain DeLacey. of Scranton, is talked of for secretary of internal affairs. The Jenks people are opposed to him, though, because the bulk of the Lackawanna delegates are for Gordon. William Trickett, dean of the law school of Dickinson college Carlisle, is being industricusly boomed for superior court judge.

GUFFEY IS BOSS

That Colone; Guffey controls the situation is admitted by the managers of both candidates. He has only to say the word and he will be nominated for governor on the first ballot. He says, however, that he is satisfied with the honer of serving as a member of the national committee and that he does. not want a state office. As an evidence of his popularity, a street demorstration was held tonight in Jenk's behalf and a half dozen delegates carried banners bearing the inscription; "We are for wheever Colonel Guffey wants, hurrah." The Jenks people have been claiming for the past 48 hours that postponed, rain. Guffey is pledged to the support of their favorite. If their claims can be relied upon, then there is no question of Jenks' nomination. Gordon's friends are just as hopeful as ever and if he defeated he will go down with fiving colors. There were rumors during the day that the judge would withdraw if he saw no chance of his nomination. This was denied, however, by his managers, and it looks now as vill be a fight to a finish with Jenks the winner.



HONORS FOR O'BOYLE.

A short session of the executive committee was held at noon to arrange the preliminaries of the convention. P. A. O'Boyle, of Wilkes Barre, was selected to preside as temporary chairman. Matt Savage, of Clearfield, was chosen secretary: Paul J. Mahoney, of Beaver. sergeant-at-arms; J. Wood Clark, of Indiana, reading clerk. A committee of which Colonel Guffey is chairman was appointed to draft a platform to be submitted at a subsequent meeting of the executive committee.

A meeting of the state committee was held tonight to select the standing committees of the convention. After this had been done. Thomas J. Ryan, of Philadelphia, presented a statement asking that the Philadelphia contest decided by the state committee at its | Leader. annual meetings in Harrisburg on April 29 last, be reopened. A resolution to this effect was adopted by a vote of 38 to 19. The contest was then referred to the executive committee, which is controlled by the anti-Gor-

donites. Thomas Delahunty, of Philadelphia, chairman of the Gordon city committee, which was reorganized by the state committee at its previous meeting, denounced this change of front as outrageous and irregular.
