Twenty-second Anniversary of Niagara Hose Company Celebrated.

LARGE GATHERING OF FIREMEN AND CITY OFFICIALS AT THE HOSE HOUSE-BEAUTIFUL BAN-NER PRESENTED TO THE COM-PANY-JAMES B. HAWLEY HAD HIS FINGERS HADY INJURED AT THE STORRS BREAKER-STRIKE STILL ON AT WEST RIDGE COLLIERY.

The members of the Niagara Hose company fittingly celebrated tventy-second anniversary of the company's inception last evening. Present with them were the delegations from Binghamton, Wilkes-Barre, Pittston and the various fire companies of the city and also members of both branches of the councils. In preparation for the occasion the company's headquarters were decorated with evergreen, ferns and bunting. Scated in the parlors of the second floor was a musical trio, which furnished excellent and stirring music through the entire evening.

The festivities did not really begin until about 10 o'clock, when the members of the councils and a large delegation arrived. Speechmaking was immediately begun. One of the most interesting features of the evening was the presentation of the banner given by Chief Hickey for the quickest time in getting out, which was done by Permanent Man William Eldridge, in the remarkable fast time of 13% seconds, smashing all previous records made in the city.

In the absence of the chief, who has not yet recovered from his recent accident, the presentation fell to the of Captain James Moir, who, though unprepared, made a speech that completely captured the attention of those present. His remarks were applauded to echo.

The banner, a beautiful white slik with the name of the Niagara Hose company printed in gold letters, was turned over to the company.




