Surrounded by His Family the Iron Prince Sinks to Rest in Peaceful Slumber-Sketch of an Eventful Career-Achievements of Historical Interest.

Berlin, July 21 .- Prince Bismarck died shortly before 11 o'clock last night. Prince Otto Eduard Leopeld Bis-marck-Schonhausen was born of an old noble family of the "Mark" (Brandeburg) at Schonhausen, April 1, 1815. He was created a count September 16, 1865, and Prince von Bismurck in March, 1871. He was educated at the University of Cottingen and Griefswald. Brought up in the political faith of the Junkers, or Prussian Tory Squirearchy, he became in 1846 a member of the provincial diet of Saxony, and of the Prussian diet, in which he first attracted attention by his flory speeches in defence of the old mon-archial party. During the revolutionary period of 1848 the services he rendered in the public debates to the Conservative cause led to his appointment as the representative of Prussla in the diet of the old German Bund at Frank-furt. Austria was then all-powerful in the German Bund. From the time of Bismarck's appearance, however, the volce of Prussia began to have increasing weight. The successful audac-ity with which he checkmated Austrian intrigue at Frankfort was the source of constant irritation at Vienna, and naturally tended to produce some estrangement botween the Austrian and Prussian courts. Bismarck was sent as ambassador to St. Petersburg in 1850, and held that position until 1862. In May of 1862 he became Prussian ambassador at Paris. Five months later he was made first minister of the Prussian crown. Within the next ten years he humbled the Austrian empire, destroyed the French empire and created the new German empire. He remodelled the map of Europe, dismembering Denmark and France. He enlarged the frontiers of Prussia by the annexation of various provinces, including the dominions of three de-throned German princes, and succeeded in placing Germany, which had previously been the weakest and least respected of all the great powers, at the head of all the states of Europe. THE FRANCO-GERMAN WAR.

In 1864 Bismarck withdrew for some months from active public life, but he was in power again before the end of the year. Then came the Franco-Ger-

man war of 1870, and after a campaign consisting of an unbroken series of victories, largely due to the strategic genius of Count von Moltke, King William was able, through his chancellor, to dictate terms of peace to his helpless assailant.

Of the events in Prince Bismarck's life subsequent to the Franco-German war, it may be mentioned that he presided at the congress of Berlin in 1878 and 1880, and the colonial conference of 1884.



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his laws, which were afterwards repealed, interfering with the religious liberty of the Catholic priesthood, led to a long and bitter struggle with the Catholic church, and made all its adherents his bitter enemies. Equally severe was his policy with regard to Social Democrats, his draconic measures against whom produced the profoundest discontent among the working classes in the large cities.

Prince Bismarck took a prominent part in connection with the triple alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy, which is understood to be directed against a possible alliance between Russia and France against the German powers.

RESIGNATION AS MINISTER. The reported resignation of Bismarck as Prussian prime minister and counsellor was announced in February, 1899, but did not actually occur until March 17 of that year, when divergences of opinion between him and the emperor led to his retirement. His departure from Berlin was made the occasion of a great popular demonstration.

Since then Prince Bismarck has resided at his country seat. Two attempts have been made on Prince Bismarck's life, the first by a

funatic named Blind, on May 7, 1866. at Berlin; the second on July 13, 1874, by Kullman, at Kissing.

THE LAST ILLNESS.

Bismarck's Condition Was Not Considered Dangerous.

London, July 31 .- A special dispatch to the Associated Press says the news of Prince Bismarck's death reached Berlin at a late hour and was only generally known this morning. A number of vapers, including the Post, the Vorwaerts and the Deutsche Zeitung, did not contain the news of the prince's demise. The Kreuz Zeitung and some others had only a brief notice.

The Nachrichten gives the fullest details of the last days and death of Bismarck. It says:

On Tuesday evening an improvement set in, in the prince's condition, in which repeated changes for the worse had occurred since October last; and he was able to appear at the table and take part in the conversation, drinking champagne and afterwards smoking several pipes, which he had not done lately.

His condition was so satisfactory that Dr. Schweninger, after the prince had gone to bed, left with the intention of returning on Saturday. His condition was comparatively satisfactory throughout Friday and Saturday morn ing. He read the Nachrichten and conversed on politics, particularly referring to Russian affairs. In the forenoon he took luncheon, grumbling jocularly at the small proportion of spirits in his drinking water.
