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# **TROOPS TO SAIL** FOR MANILA WILL BE SENT TO HONOLULU TO

AWAIT ORDERS.

The First New York to Be Aided in Garrison Duty at Hawaii by One Battalion of the Hawaiian Militia-Formal Charges Against the Tennessean Volunteers for the Assault on a Negro-Col. Barber's Position.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.-Formal charges have been preferred against four members of the Tennessee regiment in connection with the assault on Dan Thomas, a negro, last Monday. The names of the men accused are as follows: Privates Davis, Clark, Vanderson and Scruggs.

The transports here are the Scandia, Australia and City of Sydney, and the City of Peking is due to arrive from Manila. The troops which are to be sent to Honolulu, as a half-way station in case they should be needed by General Merritt in the Philippines, form two brigades. The first, under General Miller, consists of the Seventh and Eighth California Volunteer regiments, the Third Battalion of California heavy artillery, Troop A, of the Nevada Cav alry, and a detachment of the hospital corps. The second, under the command of Colonel Funston, is composed of the Twentleth Kansas, First Tennessee and Fifty-first Iowa, with a small detachment of Oregon recruits. The troops under General King which sailed on the Arizona, will be held at Honolulu to await further orders. General King will have immediate command of the new camp of mobilization of Honolulu. which is of the Department of Callfornia, and has no connection with the expeditionary forces, but he will, in a measure be independent of General Merriam.

## THE SUPPLIES.

It is possible that the supplies carried by the Arizona and Scandia are to be placed all on one vessel, which is to continue to Manila, while the other is to be brought back to be loaded again with troops for Honolulu.

Brigadier General King is in charge of the troops on the Arizona. Major General Merriam has instructions to erect a hospital at Honolulu to cost, with its site, \$35,000. Barracks for at least 1,300 troops are also to be erected at Honolulu.

The First New York regiment, consisting of 1,300 men and 300 of the regiment of Volunteer en-Second gineers, have been sent here as the United States first garrison on the island. That force is to be increased by the enlistment of a battalion of 400 men from the Hawailan army. General Merriam has authority to spend \$190,000 for the erection of the barracks Officers' quarters at Honolulu are to be built also, and it is understood that General Merriam has power to spend \$58,000 for that purpose. Residences for forty-four officers are to be crected. One of the most exacting duties General Merriam is entrusted with is the survey of the harbor of Honolulu and a report as to the best means of fortifying. He has with him three competent engineers who will have immediate charge of that work.


