He Assures Sick Men That All Will Be Allowed Furloughs When Well Enough to Enjoy Them-The Heat Plays Havoc in the Camp and Is Responsible for Many Deaths.

DEATHS FROM HEAT.

There are 1.120 sick in the general hospital and 336 in the detention hospital. There are 210 cases of typhoid fever. One hundred and thirty sick of the Eighth Ohio volunteers were landed from the Mohawk today and taken to the detention hospital.

Secretary Alger, after making an in spection of the general hospital and detention camp, complimented the surgeons and the Red Cross nurses for their good work, and ordered one hundred men of the Second Engineer corps to do police duty about the camp. See retary Alger also ordered that wooden flooring be placed in the kitchen, dining tents and general hospital. Colonel Roosevelt arrived in camp today from his home at Oyster Bay, where he has been spending a week's furlough.

# IRON AND STEEL TRADE.

#### The Market Shows Continued Improvement.

Pittsburg, Aug. 25 .- The American Manufacturer will say tomorrow: While the activity in sales in the iron and steel trade is not as active this week as it was last, the improvement continues and the market has lost nothing. The advanced prices quoted last week are still held and the demand at most points is fully as strong The condition of trade is shown in the action of the axle manufacturers who are said to have recently advanced prices \$10 per ton. The makers of forge billets thereupon put their prices from \$20 to \$24 per ton. At Philadelphia the pig iron market is excited by outside influences. Some of the largest makers claim to be sold up to the close of the year, but the activity in the market is greater than the advance in prices. The steel billet trade is active as those interested were caught by surprise The market has advanced \$1, and higher figures are expected. The situation in the bar mills is promising. There are increased sales of sheets and the 12. plate mills are breaking all records. At New York there are encouraging signs of a revival and everybody is more hopeful. Orders for pig iron are numerous. The Chicago market is stronger than it was at last report, as there is a little stiffening all along the line without any general advance.




