Trade Changes in the West Indies.

THIS interest in the business opportunities offered in Cuba and Porto Rico which is felt by the business men of the United States is shown by the large number of letters that subject have been receiving from the treasury bureau of statistics.

In general terms it may be said that the imports into Cuba and Porto Rico have averaged about \$60,000,000 a year during the past decade.

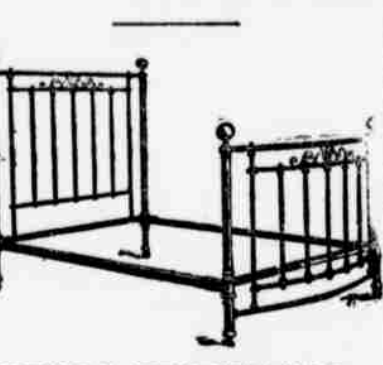
A GREAT CANVASS.
