

THE EVACUATION IS UNDER WAY

PORTO RICO THE SCENE OF OPERATION.

Posts adjacent to San Juan abandoned by the Spanish—Americans may enter Spanish lines in Pursuit of Marauders—Influx of Scheme Promoters Continues.

San Juan, Island of Porto Rico, Sept. 19 (Delayed in Transmission)—The evacuation of the outlying positions occupied by the Spaniards began today. Aguadilla, San Sebastian and Laros were abandoned by them, and the troops of General Garrison's brigade and the Eleventh Infantry moved in and hoisted the American flag. The Spanish troops from the abandoned positions are being concentrated at Arechibo, from whence they will reach San Juan by railroads so soon as transportation is available. They could not enter the city before, owing to its crowded condition. On Wednesday the Spaniards will evacuate the island of Vieques, where a company of American troops, dispatched from General Grant's brigade, has already been landed. The Spanish troops from the island of Vieques will remain at Humacao until the Spaniards fall back on the line of the military road. Spanish control is now confined to within a line drawn from Humacao, to Abonito and from there to Arechibo, less than one-third of the island.

The Spanish evacuation commissioner, at the meeting of the Spanish and American commissioners today, officially informed the Americans that they had been notified of the sailing from Spain of two transports intended to embark troops here, and also that 400 Spanish soldiers will sail from here tomorrow on a transport which is expected from Cuba. The departing troops consist of 200 sick men and 200 members of the Engineers' regiment.

The meeting of the commissioners was entirely without friction, and it was owing to the good feeling prevailing between our soldiers and those of Spain that it was decided to allow the company of Americans to land at the Island of Vieques before the Spaniards left.

It was decided today in the interest of the order of the Island to allow Americans to enter the Spanish lines, and vice versa, in pursuit of marauders. This obliterates the neutral zone between the lines and it is believed it will result in the complete suppression of disorders at Utuado and other places in the interior, and afford protection to natives and Spanish residents alike. In spite of the fact that some of them have been disillusioned, the influx of American promoters continues. Most of them are at Ponce and unable to reach San Juan, owing to the military regulations. An agent of the Sugar Trust is, among many others, seeking business opportunities, franchises and concessions. All of them are fretting over the unavoidable delays.

The condition of the troops on the island is not improving. Almost two thousand men have reported sick. General Brooke is doing all in his power to improve the condition of the soldiers and afford them every comfort possible. In so doing, he has ordered every military tent on the island to be fitted with flooring.

THE MANILA TROOPS.

A question of the rights of the United States.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Some question has arisen as to the rights of the United States to send troops to Manila under the terms of the protocol and the armistice which followed. Upon this matter being brought to the attention of the officials of the war department it was stated that under the protocol Manila city, harbor and bay were placed under the control of the United States and that we have the same right to reinforce Manila that we would have to send troops to any other army post.

MR. SMITH'S SPEECHES.

Will Be Heard at Omaha and at Columbus.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Postmaster General Charles Emory Smith, in addition to other addresses, has agreed to make one at Omaha and another at Columbus. He will leave for Omaha on Tuesday next and will be accompanied by his wife and children. Mr. Smith is also to visit at Columbus, Ohio, on Friday next.

The postmaster general is now in Philadelphia and will return to Washington at the end of the week. He will leave for the west early in October, accompanied by Mrs. Smith and his private secretary, Mr. C. E. Dawson.

THE MARKETS.

Wall Street Review.
New York, Sept. 19.—The stock market today presented all the characteristics of genuine reaction. Last week's sharp recovery eliminated the short interests very largely and the forced liquidation of profits had been mostly completed during the previous week. The market was, therefore, set free to a great extent from the technical influences and in condition to respond to the prospects for general business in the country. Its failure to do so yesterday was attributed to the unsettling influence of the slump in sugar. The bears were evidently timid about continuing their campaign further against sugar and were inclined to cover, so that this influence towards reaction was removed. However, the market dropped heavily towards lower basals with one or two exceptions in the list and closed only barely steady at a level generally 1 per cent. or more below last night's level. Total sales were 1,100 shares.
