

CONSIDERING DREYFUS CASE

THE FRENCH MINISTRY DECIDES ON A REVISION.

Resolution Adopted at a Full Meeting of the Cabinet—Rochefort Declares Esterhazy Has Been Bribed by the "Dreyfus Syndicate."

Paris, Sept. 26.—At a meeting of the cabinet this morning, all the ministers being present, a decision was taken in favor of a revision of the trial of former Captain Dreyfus and the documents in the case will be sent to the court of cassation.

Herri Rochefort, in his paper, the Intransigent, today accuses Major Esterhazy of having been bribed by the so-called Dreyfus syndicate to "cover himself with dishonor by confessing to a forgery of which he was twice acquitted."

ESTERHAZY'S MOVEMENTS.—Continuing, M. Rochefort remarks: "Recently, without any apparent incentive, Esterhazy mysteriously went to London, abandoning his three hundred francs monthly."

The Labre Patole asserts that Major Esterhazy has telegraphed to the minister of war, General Chanoine, protesting against the story printed in the Observer, of London, purporting to be a confession made by the major, the substance of which was that he was the author of the bordereau, a document which is said to have furnished proof of the guilt of Dreyfus.
