

Near the Babylon breaker they anpropriated a hand car which was lying close to the railroad track and placing it on the rails loaded it with the barrels of whiskey. The intention was to run the hand car up along the Austin branch to some point where it had been agreed upon to hide the plunder. The road passes through a wild and sparsely settled territory.

The burglars had made but little progress with the hand car when an limit. of it came down the track. The men made no effort to remove the hand car from the track or give the alarm. They simply described their carrier and awaited results. When the collision occurred Howell and Carrell were standing on the first car, a gondola. It was thrown from the track and turned upside down, killing Howell and serously injuring Carrott.

When the other trainmen reached he over-turned car they were greeted y a volley of bullets and had to throw themselves on the ground to avoid being hit. The bullets were fired by the burglars. After emptying their guns they took to the woods and the work of getting Howell and Carroll from beneath the car began.

Howell was 21 years of age and re sided with his parents on Price street.

The Supreme court held that the city had the right to make such agreement, and that the contract die not conflict with any

It is essential to the validity of a contract of this nature that it be certified by the city controller. The act of May %, 1889, P. L. 303, provides that "every contract involving an appropriation of money shall designate the item of appropriation upon which it is founded, and the esti-mated amount of the expenditure there-under shall be charged against such item ander shall be charged against such item and so certified by the controller on the contract before it shall take effect as a contract, and the payments required by such contract shall be made from the fund appropriated therefor. If the controller shall certify any contract in excess of the appropriation made therefor, the city shall not be liable for such excess but the conof be liable for such excess but the controller and his surcies shall be liable for the same, which may be recovered in an action at law by the contracting party aggrieved. It shall be the duty of the con-troller to certify contracts for the payment of which sufficient appropriation has been made."

MCGLLUM'S OPINION.

In rendering the opinion of the court in the Chester case. Mr. Justice McCollam, in treating this phase of the question, stated: "If a contract involves an ap-propriation of money, it is the control-ler's duty to certify upon it the estimated amount of the expenditure thercunder hargeable against the item of appropria-ion on which it is founded. He does not make or supervise the estimates, but he is required to certify it upon the contract. inake of supervise the estimates, but he is required to certify it upon the contract. If the contract is to furnish light or water for a term of years, to be paid for monthly, quarterly or annually, he should certify thereunder for the ensuing fiscal ear. In other words it is his duty to sertify upon it the estimate made by the proper department in accordance with the fact."
